AN ORDINANCE CONCERNING

SECTION 1. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF BALTIMORE, That the

16 17 18	(2) A firm is not an eligible small business enterprise in any fiscal year in which its gross receipts, averaged over the firm's previous 5 fiscal years, exceed the size standards of 13 CFR Part 121.
9	(K) [(j)] Sole proprietorship.
20 21	"Sole proprietorship" means a business enterprise that is 100% owned, operated, and controlled by 1 individual.
22	(L) [(k)] Subcontractor.
23 24	"Subcontractor" means a business enterprise that has a direct contract with a contractor to perform part of the work on a contract.
25	(M) [(l)] Supplier.
26	"Supplier" means a business enterprise that:
27	(1) furnishes needed items to a contractor; and
28	(2) either:
29 30	(i) is involved in the manufacture or distribution of the supplies or materials; or
3 1	(ii) otherwise warehouses and ships the supplies.

1	(N) [(m)] Women's Business Enterprise (WBE).
2	"Women's Business Enterprise" or "WBE" means a business enterprise:

11	(a) Findings.
12 13	(1) The Mayor and City Council makes the findings contained in this subsection, on full consideration of:
14 15	(i) the extensive findings made by an independent task force prior to the enactment of Ordinance 90-610;
16 17	(ii) the evidence of significant levels of utilization disparity identified by the 2000 Disparity Study;
18	(iii) hearings held by the City Council;
19 20	(IV) THE EXTENSIVE FINDINGS OF THE 2007 DISPARITY STUDY, "RACE, SEX, AND BUSINESS ENTERPRISE: EVIDENCE FROM THE CITY OF BALTIMORE"; and
21	(v) [(iv)] all other relevant facts.
22 23 24 25 26	(2) Past discrimination in the City's contracting process by prime contractors against minority and women's business enterprises has resulted in significant underutilization of minority and women's business enterprises in contracts awarded by the City of Baltimore. As determined by the [2000] 2007 Disparity Study, this disparity has been persistent, pervasive, and statistically significant based on available vendor data.
27 28 29	(3) This discrimination has occurred in the major City contracting markets (construction, commodities, architectural and engineering, and services), with the effect of significant underutilization of minority and women's business enterprises.
30 31 32 33	(4) The provisions of this subtitle are necessary to overcome the effects of past discrimination and to prevent ongoing discrimination in the City's contracting process, while assuring that high quality goods and services are obtained through the competitive bidding process.

1 2	(5) A general goal of this subtitle is to provide a narrowly tailored remedy to past discrimination, a goal that is advanced by:
3 4	(i) setting minority and women's business enterprise goals that are flexible and rationally related to the disparity identified in the City's contracting markets;
5 6	(ii) instituting race- and gender-neutral remedies in conjunction with the MBE/WBE Program;
7	[(iii) setting separate annual goals for different categories of contracts;]
8	(III) [(iv)] setting goals on a contract-by-contract basis;
9	(IV) [(v)] providing criminal penalties for fraudulent misuse of this subtitle;
10	(v) [(vi)] requiring regular review of the necessity for this subtitle;
11 12	(VI) [(vii)] limiting those minority and women's businesses that qualify under this subtitle to those located in the Baltimore City Market Area;
13 14	(VII) [(viii)] requiring regular review of the categories included in the definition of minority group members; and
15 16	(VIII) [(ix)] providing for post-bid submission of required information about minority and women's business enterprises as well as other subcontractors.
17	§ 28-6. Automatic termination.
18 19 20 21	This subtitle automatically expires on [September 30, 2007] JUNE 30, 2012, unless the City Council, after causing an appropriate study to be undertaken, conducting public hearings, and hearing testimonial evidence, finds that the purposes identified in this subtitle have not yet been achieved, in which case this subtitle may be extended for 5 more years.

23	§ 28-16. Establishment.
24	(a) 2007 Disparity Study Goals.
25	Based upon the 2007 Disparity Study, the annual participation goals are:

21	(b) Goals, not quotas.
22	Annual participation goals are not and may not be quotas.
23	[§ 28-19. Council review.
24	(a) Submission to Council.
25 26	Before the annual participation goals take effect, the Board of Estimates must present them to the City Council for its consideration.
27	(b) Council action.
28	The City Council may:

1	(1) accept the goals set by the Board of Estimates; or
2	(2) adopt different goals in accordance with the criteria required by this Part III.
3	(c) Council inaction.
4 5	If the City Council does not act within 30 days after the Board's goals are presented to it, the Board's goals automatically take effect.]
6	§§ 28-18 TO 28-20. {Reserved}
7	Part IV. Contract Participation Goals
8	§ 28-22. Considerations.
9	(a) In general.
10	In setting the goals on a contract, the Office must consider:
11 12 13	(1) the availability in various industry classifications and professions of MBEs and WBEs that are qualified and willing to provide goods, expertise, and services on the particular contract;
14	(2) the level of utilization of these firms in past contracts awarded by the City;
15	(3) the contract specifications;
16	(4) the adverse impact on non-MBEs and -WBEs; and
17	(5) any other relevant factors.
18	(b) Minimum availability.
19 20	For a goal to be applicable to a contract, at least 2 MBEs or WBEs must be available for that goal.
21	(c) Construction contracts of \$1,000,000 or more.
22 23 24 25	On construction contracts for which the estimated cost is \$1,000,000 or more, the Office may, in consultation with the contracting agency, set goals for MBEs divided into subgoals for African American-, Hispanic American-, Asian American-, or Native American-owned firms.
26	(D) Architectural or engineering contracts.
27 28 29 30	On architectural or engineering contracts, the Office may, in consultation with the contracting agency, set goals for MBEs divided into subgoals for African American-, Hispanic American-, Asian American-, or Native American-owned firms.

1	(E) (D) [(C)] Consultation.
2 3	In establishing goals on each contract, the Office must consult with the contracting agency, the City Purchasing Agent, or both.
4	§ 28-25. Office review and report.
5	(a) Office to evaluate.
6 7 8	Annually, the Office must review MBE and WBE participation on all contracts and procurement to evaluate the effect of the Program AND THE CITY'S PROGRESS TOWARDS MEETING THE ANNUAL GOALS.
9	Part V. [Standards] Counting MBE and WBE Participation
0	§ 28-31. In general.
1	(A) PART GOVERNS.
12	MBE and WBE participation toward meeting contract goals must be counted in accordance with this Part V.

25	The certified business enterprise that is a member of the joint venture must be responsible
26	for a DISTINCT, clearly defined portion of the work to be performed WITH ITS OWN
27	FORCES, equal to its share in the ownership, control, and management of the joint
28	venture.
29	§ 28-35. One subcontractor, one goal.
30	A BUSINESS ENTERPRISE THAT IS CERTIFIED AS BOTH AN MBE AND A WBE MAY NOT BE
31	COUNTED TOWARD BOTH MBE AND WBE GOALS FOR THE SAME PROJECT. THE BIDDER MUST
32	SELECT THE GOAL FOR WHICH THE BUSINESS ENTERPRISE IS TO BE COUNTED TOWARD.
33	§ 28-38. Insurance companies; travel agents.

21	(2) Any bid that does not include the certified business participation affidavit is
22	[nonresponsive] NON-RESPONSIVE.
23	(f) Report for final payment.
24	(1) Before final payment may be made under the contract, the contractor must submit a
25	list of all subcontractors utilized on the contract, both MBE/WBE and non-
26	MBE/WBE.
27	(2) The list must include, as to each subcontractor:
28	(i) its name;
29	(II) THE SERVICE OR GOODS PROVIDED;
30	(III) [(ii)] the total amount paid to it; and
31	(IV) [(iii)] its owner's race/ethnicity and sex.

1	§ 28-53. All contracts – Bid specifications.
2 3	Bid conditions, requests for proposals, and all other specifications for contracts awarded by the City must require that, where a contract goal is applicable, the bidder must:

21	§ 28-61. Agency's pre-solicitation request.
22	(b) Criteria for granting.
23	The Office may grant the waiver or reduction if the Office determines that:
24 25	(1) the reasonable and necessary requirements of the contract render subcontracting or other participation of businesses other than the bidder infeasible; or
26 27 28	(2) at least 2 qualified certified business enterprises capable of providing the goods or services required by the contract are unavailable in the Baltimore City [market area] MARKET AREA despite every feasible attempt to locate them.
29	§ 28-62. Bidder's pre-award request.
30	(a) In general.
