1 A COUNCIL RESOLUTION concerning

2 **Informational Hearing – Cleaner Streets**

3 FOR the purpose of requesting that representatives from the Department of Public Works, and  
4 other City agencies working to make Baltimore cleaner, appear before the Council to discuss  
5 the City’s plan for cleaner streets and neighborhoods, the current results of this plan, and  
6 what additional steps can be taken to progress towards a cleaner Baltimore.

7 **Recitals**

8 A common concern raised by Baltimore residents is the cleanliness of our streets and  
9 neighborhoods. Litter, debris, and trash are not only an aesthetic concern, they also harm the  
10 environment, drive down property values, and discourage people from investing time, effort, and  
11 money into our City.

12 Last Spring, the Department of Public Works and the Administration unveiled an expanded  
13 street sweeping effort intended to regularly clean 90% of Baltimore’s streets. This effort has had  
14 mixed results, with some areas showing a clear improvement while residents in other areas report  
15 no changes.

16 It is also not clear if the City has a real, comprehensive, plan to address the problems of litter,  
17 illegal dumping, and general grime that continue to plague too many City neighborhoods. Street  
18 sweeping, done properly, can be an important element in the City’s efforts to combat these  
19 scourges, but it cannot succeed on its own without parallel investments in education and other  
20 cleanup initiatives.

21 A year into its implementation, it is important that the Council and the public be provided  
22 with a clear update on the status and results of the City’s expanded street sweeping program.  
23 Equally important is ensuring that this program is given a real chance to succeed by being  
24 situated within a coordinated plan to provide the City with cleaner streets and neighborhoods.

7 Director of Public Works, the Health Commissioner, the Director of General Services, the  
8 Director of Recreation and Parks, and the Mayor’s Legislative Liaison to the City Council.
