



City Council Bill 15-0541





- The well-documented hazards of smoking remain a concern, regardless of the product's flavor.
- Curriculum and health hazard experts often teach resistance skills to help children learn to say "no" to offers of alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs. In addition, students are more likely to smoke in a location where they see other students and adults smoking.
- Children are especially sensitive to the effects of secondhand smoke. Passing by an
 outdoor smoking area may trigger an asthma attack, or worsen breathing problems for
 students and adults with certain health conditions.
- The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) ranks Maryland as having the highest prevalence of asthma in children and adults, compared to other states nationally.
