- (9) Master planning and urban design initiatives, relying on comprehensive demographic data;
- (10) Comprehensive advertising and marketing campaigns promoting Downtown Baltimore as the place to live, work, visit, and invest; and
- (11) General constituent services work -

all of which activities and programs support the redevelopment of downtown and address problems facing the Central Business District.

Having evaluated the activities and undertakings of the Authority and the District, the Mayor and City Council believes that further renewal and continuation of the District and the Authority is in the best interests of the City of Baltimore.

SECTION 1. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF BALTIMORE, That, subject to the Renewal Process described in Section 2 of this Resolution, the District and the Authority are renewed and continued for an additional 5 years, from July 1, 2017, through June 30, 2022. However, the Authority may not impose any taxes or charges, other than those in effect on the date of enactment of this Resolution, until the Renewal Process is completed and certified by the Board of Estimates.

SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Estimates must use the procedures described in Article 14, § 1-19, to determine whether opposition to continuation of the District exists in excess of the Base Level Protests. If this excess opposition exists, the Board of Estimates must then conduct a referendum, comparable to that described in § 1-19, to determine whether the District should be renewed and continued for another 5 years.

**SECTION 3.** AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That this Resolution takes effect on the date it is enacted.
