> Re: City Council Bill 17-0100 - Repeal Canton Crossing PUD

Dear President and City Council Members:

The Law Department has reviewed City Council Bill 17-0100 for form and legal sufficiency. The bill would repeal the prior the ordinances that established and amended the Planned Unit Development for Canton Crossing. There are no legal impediments to this repeal. Specifically, with respect to floating zones, such as a PUD, Maryland Courts have said that the legislative body must have "a little more than a scintilla of evidence" to support its decision and that decision must not be "arbitrary, capricious or illegal." Rockville Crushed Stone, Inc. v. Montgomery County, 78 Md. App. 176, 190 (1989)(citations omitted); accord Richmarr Holly Hills v. Am. PCS, L.P., 117 Md. App. 607, 639 (1997); see also MLC Auto., LLC v. Town of S. Pines, 532 F.3d 269, 281 (4th Cir. 2008)(citing Nectow v. City of Cambridge, 277 U.S. 183, 187-88 (1928)); Lingle v. Chevron U.S.A. Inc., 544 U.S. 528, 543 (2005)).

Therefore, the Law Department approves the bill for form and legal sufficiency.
