



The Law Department has been asked to review City Council Bill 18-0176 for form and legal sufficiency. The bill clarifies a requirement that, to gate or green an alley, the majority of structures abutting the alley must be "residential." The bill clarifies that abutting structures that are either residential or are non-residential on the first level but, in accordance with the Zoning Code, have one or more upper stories that are being used or are designed and intended to be used as residential dwellings, will both meet the majority residential standard of the law.

Article II, Section 35(e) of the Baltimore City Charter give the Mayor and City Council authority to by ordinance "gate an alley that is no longer needed for through pedestrian or vehicular traffic, in order to promote the public health, safety or welfare. This bill is an appropriate exercise of that authority. Accordingly, the Law Department approves the bill for form and legal sufficiency.



Background

Council Bill 18-0176 revises the Baltimore City Code with regards to the standards for alley gating. It specifies that a majority of the properties abutting an alley must be residential or buildings that include dwellings above the first floor, whereas the Code only included the former before for consideration.

The Law Department approved 18-0176 for form and legal sufficiency. The Department of Housing and Community Development provided a favorable report. The Department of Transportation provided a favorable report, noting that 18-0176 "will positively impact... neighborhoods and communities" with regards to "support[ing] development."

The Law Department has been asked to review City Council Bill 18-0176 for form and legal sufficiency. The bill clarifies a requirement that, to gate or green an alley, the majority of structures abutting the alley must be "residential." The bill clarifies that abutting structures that are either residential or are non-residential on the first level but, in accordance with the Zoning Code, have one or more upper stories that are being used or are designed and intended to be used as residential dwellings, will both meet the majority residential standard of the law.

Article II, Section 35(e) of the Baltimore City Charter give the Mayor and City Council authority to by ordinance "gate an alley that is no longer needed for through pedestrian or vehicular traffic, in order to promote the public health, safety or welfare. This bill is an appropriate exercise of that authority. Accordingly, the Law Department approves the bill for form and legal sufficiency.












Fig. 7	NAME & TITLE	Michelle Pourciau, Director	CITY of	1






