


In general, the Maryland Public Ethics Law, Art. 5, Subtitle 8, Part II of the General Provisions Article of the Maryland Code, requires that the City have an Ethics Code that is similar to the provisions of State Ethics Law but allows for modifications to the extent necessary to make the provisions relevant to the prevention of conflicts of interest in that jurisdiction.

City Council Bill 18-0230 complies with the directive in State law with respect to content of local public ethics laws. The Law Department therefore approves City Council Bill 18-023 for form and legal sufficiency.


City Council Bill #18-0230 was created for the purpose of requiring quarterly rather than annual lobbying reports from lobbyists; requiring the Ethics Board to post lobbying reports online within 30 days of their receipt; requiring that lobbyists affirmatively identify themselves and their clients when engaging in lobbying activities; allowing the Ethics Board to prohibit a person found to have violated the lobbying provisions of the Ethics Code from lobbying City public servants for up to 3 years; clarifying and conforming related provisions; and generally relating to the regulation of lobbyists.


The Ethics Board does not have a separate budget, and its staff and activities are funded through the Legislative Reference agency. This proposal will have some costs, stemming from technology and/or human resource investments needed to handle quarterly lobbying reports and post them online within 30 days.

The Board receives approximately 200 annual reports on paper from lobbyists, averaging ten pages each, which provide details on lobbying expenses and gifts. Currently, the reports are not posted online, though the Board's website includes annually updated lists of registered lobbyists. It would be challenging for Ethics Board staff to absorb the workload associated with manually scanning the reports and putting them online each quarter, especially if they are posted individually in a searchable format that is user-friendly for the public. Based on its experience with a similar effort in 2014 — scanning and posting financial disclosure forms — the Ethics Board would utilize a temporary employee to assist for one week each quarter at an estimated total cost of \$2,100 per year. Another option would be creating a new module on the Board's website that would allow lobbyists to fill out the forms online, and would then store the forms in a searchable database that is publically accessible. The Baltimore City Office of Information and Technology (BCIT) has not done an estimate of costs for this work, but the City's procurement records show that developing an online financial disclosure form module for the Ethics Board cost about \$60,000 in Fiscal 2014.

This proposal generated no objections from various city agencies, and its requirements could be met without a significant fiscal impact on the City. Therefore, the Department of Finance has no objection to the passage of Council Bill #18-0230.

### August 7, 2018 Hearing

- 1. Chairman Costello opened the proceedings and introduced the committee members in attendance.
- 2. Councilman Cohen summarized the bill and why it is needed.
- 3. Chairman Costello read the Law Department's report aloud.
- 4. The Finance Department confirmed that it has no objections to the bill, and noted that the bill would result in some minimal additional cost to the City.
- 5. The Ethics Board staff discussed several concerns with the bill, including that the Board did not have sufficient staff to implement its requirements. The Board recommended a delayed effective date for the increased reporting frequency and online posting requirements, as well as making the requirements of the bill contingent on resources to make implementation possible.
- 6. Numerous members of the public testified in support of the bill as it was drafted. Several registered lobbyists testified in support of the bill with amendments to require reporting on an annual or semi-annual basis, rather than quarterly, and to require an online system to streamline the registration and reporting process for lobbyists. Some of the registered lobbyists also raised the issue of groups and advocates who lobby but are not required to register under the current law because of the dollar thresholds.
- 7. Chairman Costello announced that the Committee would reconvene for a Work Session on the bill in the near future, noted that the Committee would not hear additional public testimony at the Work Session, identified several issues that could require amendments, and recessed the hearing.

### August 21, 2018 Work Session

- 1. Chairman Costello opened the proceedings and introduced the committee members in attendance.
- 2. The Office of Information and Technology discussed the steps and time needed to develop an online registration and reporting system for lobbyists in the City. The Office confirmed that a system could be ready by June 1, 2019.
- 3. The Committee considered and adopted amendments to the bill to change the definition of 'reporting period,' to require semi-annual reports rather than quarterly reports, to delay the effective date of certain requirements, and to require the Office of Information and Technology to develop an online system by June 1, 2019.
- 4. The Committee discussed additional amendments that would have required organizations that direct employees or volunteers to lobby to register in certain circumstances. The additional amendments were ultimately withdrawn.



I urge this Committee to consider an amendment reducing the reporting requirements to twice a year as opposed to four times a year. The paperwork required for those of us who

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represent multiple clients is strenuous and time consuming. Other jurisdictions do it electronically, but Baltimore City does it by paper.

Either way, I support this legislation and look forward to working with the Committee on a productive piece of legislation.



#### **ANALYSIS**

#### **Current Law**

Article 8, Subtitle 8 of the Baltimore City Code establishes requirements and prohibitions for persons who engage in certain lobbying activities for the purpose of influencing legislative or executive actions of the City. Specifically, lobbyists must register with the Baltimore City

Ethics Board and submit annual activity reports by January 31 of each year detailing their lobbying activity for the preceding year. Additionally, lobbyists must not knowingly make false statements of material fact to any public servant or conceal the identity of the client on whose behalf they are lobbying.

Article 8, Subtitle 9 provides for administrative sanctions and criminal penalties for lobbying violations. Administrative sanctions imposed by the Ethics Board can include, among other things, cease and desist orders and fines of up to \$1,000 for each violation. Additionally, any person who knowingly violates a provision of Subtitle 8 is guilty of a misdemeanor and, on conviction, is subject to a fine of not more than \$1,000 or imprisonment of not more than 12 months or both.

Sections 5-807 and 5-810 of the General Provisions Article of the Maryland Code require local jurisdictions to enact lobbying provisions that are substantially similar to the provisions of State law, with modifications that the jurisdiction considers necessary and appropriate. Section 5-705 of the General Provisions Article requires persons who lobby the State government to submit semi-annual activity reports by May 31 and November 30 of each year. Section 5-901 et seq. provides for civil and criminal penalties for violations related to lobbying.

#### **Bill Summary and Background**

Bill 18-0230 would replace the existing requirement for lobbyists to file annual activity reports with a requirement that lobbyists file quarterly activity reports by January 31, April 30, July 31, and October 31 of each year. Additionally, the bill would require the Ethics Board to post on its website a copy of each activity report within 30 days. The Department of Finance noted in its report that this requirement will likely result in some additional costs to the Department of Legislative Reference, which staffs the Ethics Board, for necessary technology or staff support.

The bill would further oblige individuals who are required to register as lobbyists, or expect that they will soon be required to register, to affirmatively identify themselves as lobbyists and to identify the clients on whose behalf they are lobbying when they interact with any City official or employee.

Finally, the bill would allow the Ethics Board to impose the additional administrative sanction of prohibiting the violator from engaging in any lobbying activity to influence any City official or employee for up to three years, and would subject anyone who knowingly fails to comply with an administrative sanction to criminal penalties.



## § 8-7. Legislative lobbying.

A person must register if, during a reporting period, the person:

- (2) in furtherance of or in connection with all such communications for that or any other legislative action, and all activities relating to those communications:
  - (i) expends \$100 or more for gifts, including meals, beverages, or special events, to 1 or more public servants;
  - (ii) incurs any expenses of \$500 or more; or
  - (iii) earns \$2,500 or more in compensation.

#### § 8-8. Executive lobbying.

A person must register if, during a reporting period, the person:

- (1) for the purpose of influencing any executive action, communicates with a public servant; and
- (2) in furtherance of or in connection with all such communications for that or any other executive action, and all activities relating to those communications, expends \$100 or more for gifts, including meals, beverages, or special events, to 1 or more public servants.

(b) Regulations; Executive Orders.

A person must register if, during a reporting period, the person:

- (1) for the purpose of influencing the development, adoption, issuance, or amendment of regulations or of an executive order, communicates with a public servant; and
- (2) in furtherance of or in connection with all such communications for that or any other executive action, and all activities relating to those communications:
  - (i) expends \$100 or more for gifts, including meals, beverages, or special events, to 1 or more public servants;
  - (ii) incurs any expenses of \$500 or more; or
  - (iii) earns \$2,500 or more in compensation.
- (c) Procurement.
  - (1) A person must register if, during a reporting period, the person:
    - (i) for the purpose of influencing executive action on a procurement contract that exceeds \$50,000, communicates with a public servant; and
    - (ii) in furtherance of or in connection with all such communications for that or any other executive action, and all activities relating to those communications:

- (2) in furtherance of or in connection with that solicitation, expends \$1,000 or more, including expenditures for salaries, contractual employees, postage, telecommunications services, electronic services, advertising, printing, or delivery services.

## Part IV. Activity Reports

## § 8-16. In general.

(a) Report required.

A lobbyist must file with the Ethics Board an activity report for each QUARTER OF A reporting period for which the lobbyist is registered or required to be registered.

- (1) office expenses of the lobbyist; and
- (2) professional and technical research and assistance.
- (b) Publications.

Each report must include the total amount expended in connection with the lobbying activities THROUGH THE END OF THE PRECEDING QUARTER for publications that expressly encourage others to communicate with 1 or more public servants.

(c) Witnesses.

Each report must include:

- (1) the total amount expended in connection with lobbying activities for witnesses THROUGH THE END OF THE PRECEDING QUARTER;
- (2) the name of each witness; and
- (3) the fees and expenses paid to each.
- (d) Food, beverages, gifts, etc.
  - (1) Each report must include the total amount expended for each of the following THROUGH THE END OF THE PRECEDING QUARTER, whether or not expended in connection with lobbying activities:
    - (i) meals and beverages for a public servant or the spouse, parent, child, or sibling of a public servant;

- (ii) special events, including parties, dinners, athletic events, entertainment, and other functions, to which a public servant or the spouse, parent, child, or sibling of a public servant is invited;
- (iii) food, lodging, or scheduled entertainment of a public servant or the spouse, parent, child, or sibling of a public servant while attending a meeting;
- (iv) tickets or free admission for a public servant or the spouse, parent, child, or sibling of a public servant to attend a professional or intercollegiate sporting event or a charitable, cultural, or political event; and
- (v) other gifts to or for a public servant or the spouse, parent, child, or sibling of a public servant.

- [(2) while engaging in lobbying activities on behalf of a person, knowingly conceal from a public servant the identity of that person.]
- (B) DUTY TO IDENTIFY THEMSELVES AND THEIR CLIENTS.

WHILE ENGAGING IN LOBBYING ACTIVITIES A LOBBYIST, OR AN INDIVIDUAL WHO EXPECTS SHE OR HE WILL SOON BE REQUIRED TO REGISTER AS A LOBBYIST, MUST, IN ANY INTERACTION WITH A PUBLIC SERVANT:

- (1) AFFIRMATIVELY IDENTIFY THEMSELVES AS A LOBBYIST; AND
- (2) IDENTIFY THE PERSON ON WHOSE BEHALF THEY ARE LOBBYING.

## § 9-5. Lobbying violations.

If, after considering a complaint brought under Subtitle 5 {"Complaints"} of this article, the Ethics Board determines that the respondent has violated any provision of Subtitle 8 {"Lobbying"} of this article, the Board may take any 1 or more of the following actions:

- (1) require a respondent who is a lobbyist to file any additional reports or information that reasonably relates to the information required by Subtitle 8;
- (2) impose a civil penalty of not more than \$1,000 for each violation;
- (3) PROHIBIT A RESPONDENT FROM ENGAGING IN ANY LOBBYING ACTIVITIES INTENDED TO INFLUENCE ANY CITY PUBLIC SERVANT ON ANY MATTER FOR A PERIOD OF NOT MORE THAN 3 YEARS; or
- (4) [(3)] take any other action authorized by § 9-4 {"In general"} of this subtitle.

## § 9-22. Violations of lobbying subtitle.

(a) In general,


