Furthermore, data from the staffing study shows that the Baltimore Police Department has a civilian employee staffing rate of 13.6%, while the police departments of comparable cities such as Oakland, New Orleans, and Newark have civilian employee staffing rates of 28.3%, 16.5% and 19.5%, respectively. Amending Section 16-8 of the Baltimore City Code of Public Laws to require the Baltimore Police Department, by year 2022 and thereafter, to have a sworn officer to civilian employee staffing ratio of 80% to 20% would force the Department to join other cities in more efficiently using their sworn resources. Moreover, it would greatly improve the Department's ability to better respond to needs of Baltimoreans and assist the Department in its effort to increase patrol officer proactive patrol time.


