



The Department of Finance is responding to City Council Bill 19-0376: Tinancial Disclosures-Fixing Filers, Filing, and Filings. The bill establishes several requirements related to employee notifications, financial disclosures, and adverse actions resulting from noncompliance.

Background

Section 3-24: Appointees-Notice Requirements

City Council Bill 19-0376 requires that all appointed persons receive written notice in a form approved by the Ethics Board detailing the requirements of training courses, conflicts affidavit, and financial disclosures. The section also outlines the proper protocol for providing this notice to an appointed person. Finally, Section 3-24 requires that a signed copy of the notice be placed in the employee's personnel file and submitted to the Ethics Board.

Section 7-1.1: Financial Disclosures

19-0376 requires each agency head to identify if a vacant position will require a financial disclosure. If so, then any advertisement or job posting must include notice of the requirement to file financial disclosures. The agency head must also provide the Board of Ethics with the appointee's name and position number within 10 days of filling the position.

The section also requires the agency head and Director of Human Resources to annually disclose the names and position numbers of all public servants who are required to file statements with the Ethics Board under the following designations: election officials and staff, agency officials and staff, certain procurement staff, legislative liaisons, enforcement, and other personnel.

The section also requires the Finance Department to post on its website a searchable list of all persons that did business with the City for the calendar year immediately preceding the current calendar year. Finally, this section requires the Ethics Board to post on its website a searchable list of all lobbyists who have registered with the Board of Ethics for the calendar year immediately preceding the current calendar year.

Section 7-9: Persons required to file

This section of 19-0376 outlines in further detail the employees that are required to complete financial disclosure statements. These include certain procurement employees, legislative liaisons, enforcement personnel, and any other public servants whose gross annual compensation from the City of Baltimore is over \$60,000.

Section 7-24: Office, employment, etc.

This section of 19-0376 outlines the contents of the financial disclosure statements and pertains to an employee's family as well as connections to certain types of businesses including lobbyists and those that contract with the City.

Section 9-5.1: Failure to File Financial Disclosure Statement

This section of 19-0376, establishes several adverse actions for noncompliance, including fines, additional notices, and possible suspension.

Impact

Several City agencies would require additional resources per the new requirements added by this bill concerning the filing of financial disclosure statements. The Ethics Board does not currently have an operating budget and is supported by the staff of the Department of Legislative Reference (DLR). DLR would need an additional staff person to monitor the financial disclosure process as well as funds to implement technology updates to meet the new requirements concerning notifying employees about filing and failure to file disclosures. The current online filling systems needs to be updated to meet new State regulations; ensuring that these updates are made as needed could be added to the scope of work under a contract to implement the updates that would be needed under this bill. DLS has attempted to assess fees around late filings under the current financial disclosure regulations but has had to work around limitations within the current online filing system.

The Department of Human Resources (DHR) would not require significant additional resources to implement the new requirements of this bill, however the Recruitment Division has advised that the requirement that all public servants making over \$60,000 must complete disclosure statements may impact City recruiting efforts. The current filing requirement is limited to employees doing specific types of tasks; expanding the filing requirement to all employees making over \$60,000 in gross income would result in a large increase in the number of employees required to file and subject them to applicable fines for non-compliance. DHR has also stated that with proper management and implementation of the new ERP system, the new requirements outlined in this bill would be easier and more efficient.

The Department of Finance (Finance) has advised that any additional resources needed to implement the requirements of this bill and any fines or late fees collected per the new requirements would be minimal. The City currently compiles a list of all entities doing business with the City on or before February 1 for the preceding calendar year that is searchable by merging information from CitiBuy, City Dynamics, and Purchase Card data using existing staff resources within the Accounting, Procurement, and Finance Administration Departments. Finance notes that there is limited information currently available on the number of individuals who have historically filed financial disclosure statements and how many of those have filed the statements late. Regardless, Finance advises that it is anticipated that the proposed changes under this bill would have minimal operational impact on the department with regards to the collection of fines for non-compliance. The Bureau of Revenue Collections or the Bureau of Accounts and Payroll Services would need to implement a collections system to collect these fines in partnership with DLS.

Conclusion

The Department of Finance does not object to City Council Bill 19-0376.



Re: Bill No. 19-0376 ("Financial Disclosures - Fixing Filers, Filing, and Filings")

You have referred the above-referenced bill to the Board of Ethics (the "Board") for its report. While the Board is broadly supportive of the goals of the bill to clarify and provide more accountability within the financial disclosure statement process, the Board is concerned that these new requirements, especially expanding the class of employees who are required to file disclosure statements and establishing a notification process for late-filed disclosures, would place an unsustainable administrative burden on its staff, which are not dedicated to the Board and primarily serve as staff to the Baltimore City Department of Legislative Reference ("DLR"). To be sure, Baltimore City is the only major jurisdiction in Maryland without dedicated staff or a dedicated budget for its State-mandated local ethics commission.

This Board currently receives and processes approximately 2,100 financial disclosure statements per year; by way of comparison, in 2019, the Montgomery County Ethics Commission expects to receive and process 1,723 statements. For FY2019, the total approved operating budget for the Montgomery County Ethics Commission was \$463,283 and included 3 full-time employees dedicated to its administration; by way of comparison, the City Board has no operating budget and has 0 full-time employees. The requirements set forth in this bill, while founded in solid public policy principles, would exacerbate an already tenuous balance with the staff's allocation of time between their primary DLR duties and their ancillary Board duties.

As drafted, the bill makes several amendments to the City Ethics Code's provisions regarding the filing of financial disclosure statements, focusing on three areas: the individuals required to file and how they are informed of those requirements; the contents of the statements themselves; and the consequences for not filing a required disclosure. In relevant part, if passed, this ordinance would:

- Require that newly-appointed City employees sign and file with the Board a notice formally acknowledging, among other things, their duty to file a financial disclosure statement;
- require agencies to identify, prior to filling, those newly-created or vacant positions for which an individual would be required to file a financial disclosure statement and provide that information to the Board;
- require any employee earning more than \$60,000 per year to file a financial disclosure statement; and
- establish a notification and disciplinary procedure for City employees who have failed to file a required financial disclosure statement.

While the Board believes that the first two measures would help to allay the confusion that some employees have as to whether the filing requirements apply to them, the latter two components of this bill would likely greatly add to the Board's administrative workload and would be untenable without dedicated funding for additional staffing.

Noting these caveats, the Board cautiously supports Council Bill 19-0376.


The Law Department has reviewed City Council Bill 19-0376 for form and legal sufficiency. It would make changes to the Ethics Article of the Baltimore City Code. Currently, someone appointed to fill a vacancy is given a notice of ethics requirements. City Code, Art. 8, §3-24. This bill would require the appointee to sign the notice and for that notice to be in the appointee's personnel file. The bill would also require that, in addition to the existing requirement of agency heads to identify those individuals who must file certain yearly ethics forms, the agency head must identify which newly created positions also require ethics filings. The bill would also require any public servant earning over \$60,000 to file financial disclosure statements, and require all those filing the disclosure statements to identify any directorships the public servant holds. Finally, the bill would increase late fees for failing to file certain statements, require that the Ethics Board send certain notices when those statements are overdue, and require agency heads to place those notices in the public servant's personnel file and/or contemplate disciplinary action.

In general, the Maryland Public Ethics Law requires that the City have an Ethics Code that is similar to the provisions of the State Ethics Law but allows for modifications to make those laws relevant to the issues of the jurisdiction. Md. Code, Gen. Prov., § 5-804, et. seq. These changes would comport with that mandate. However, the requirement that certain documents be placed in a personnel file at certain times may not be immediately enforceable if a union has negotiated a different discipline or personnel practice in a current contract. U.S. Constit., Art. I, §10.; see, e.g., Board of Trustees of the Employee Retirement System of Baltimore v. Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, et. a.l, 317 Md. 72, 100 (1989). In addition, unions may claim that they have the right to bargain about these terms. Charter, Art. II, §(55)(a)(6). For these reasons, the provisions may be deemed unenforceable or inapplicable to certain employees who are union members. Nevertheless, the Law Department can approve the bill for form and legal sufficiency.

Major Issues Discussed

- 1. Chairman Costello called the hearing to order and introduced the committee members in attendance.
- Councilman Dorsey summarized the bill, and explained his reasons for introducing it.
 Specifically, Councilman Dorsey noted the need to clarify up front who is required to file financial disclosure statements, provide meaningful penalties for failing to file, and expand the board memberships that filers must disclose.
- 3. Councilman Dorsey and committee staff explained two proposed amendments to the bill (see attached). Amendment No. 1 removed the provision of the bill that would have required all public servants earning over \$60,000 per year to file financial disclosure statements. Amendment No. 2 added a provision to the bill to expand the reporting requirements to include interests held by public servants indirectly through multiple business entities.
- 4. City agencies confirmed the recommendations in their written reports, and noted their support for Councilman Dorsey's amendments.
- 5. The representative from the Board of Ethics noted that the Board would need additional resources for technology to implement the ordinance.
- 6. Councilman Stokes asked if the bill would change the current process for filing financial disclosure statements. A representative from the Board of Ethics explained the current process, and noted that the bill would not significantly change the process for filers.
- 7. The Committee considered and adopted Councilman Dorsey's amendments.

(2) This subsection does not limit:

- (ii) the requirements of § 7-22 {"Business entities"} of this subtitle to disclose certain entities in which the public servant holds an interest.".

ANALYSIS

Current Law

Title 5 of the General Provisions Article of the Maryland Code establishes State requirements for financial disclosure statements and requires local jurisdictions to enact provisions that are similar or equivalent to the provisions of State law.

Article 8 of the Baltimore City Code ("Ethics Code") establishes various requirements for Baltimore City officials and employees related to ethics and conflicts of interest, including the filing of financial disclosure statements.

Under the Ethics Code, certain elected officials and staff, certain agency officials and staff, and all public servants involved in procurement, whose functions include influencing legislative action, or whose official duties include enforcement of laws, rules, or regulations that affect the rights of the public are required to file financial disclosure statements. Financial disclosure statements must list, among other things, each office, directorship, salaried employment, and other interest held by the public servant in any business entity that is a lobbyist, is regulated by the City, or that is doing business with the City.

Each covered official or employee must file an entry financial disclosure statement within 30 days of appointment and an annual statement by April 30 of each year. The Ethics Board currently assess a penalty of \$2 per day, not to exceed \$250 total, for failing to file the required statement.

The Ethics Code further requires agency heads or their designees to provide written notice of the requirements for training courses, conflicts affidavits, and financial disclosure statements to individuals appointed to fill vacancies within five days after the appointment. Agency heads and the Director of Human Resources must also provide the names and position numbers of all public servants who are required to file financial disclosure statements to the Ethics Board by certain dates each year.

Bill Summary

The bill amends Article 8 of the Baltimore City Code to, among other things, require more public servants to file financial disclosure statements, expand the directorships that must be disclosed in the statements, and provide new enforcement procedures and penalties for anyone who fails to file a statement by the required date.

Public Servants Required to File

The bill extends the requirement to file financial disclosure statements to all public servants whose gross annual compensation from the City is over \$60,000. Based on publicly available salary data from Open Baltimore, there were nearly 6,350 City employees whose gross compensation exceeded \$60,000 in fiscal year 2018.

Disclosure of All Directorships

The bill requires public servants to disclose each directorship that they held in any business entity. This expands on the existing requirement to disclose each directorship in any business entity that is a lobbyist, is regulated by the City, or that is doing business with the City.

Enforcement Procedures and Penalties

The bill provides for escalating sanctions for public servants who fail to file the required financial disclosure statements, including written notices, referrals for investigation and suspension without pay, and financial penalties.

If a public servant fails to file the required statement within **5 days** of the due date, the Ethics Board must notify the public servant in writing and inform them of the potential consequences of continued noncompliance.

If the public servant has still failed to file the required statement **15 days** after the due date, the Ethics Board must again notify the public servant in writing and provide a copy of the notice to the public servant's agency head, the Director of Human Resources, and the City Solicitor.

If the public servant has still failed to file the required statement **30 days** after the due date, the Ethics Board must refer the matter in writing to the Office of the Inspector General for investigation. The Board must also send a copy of the referral to the public servant, their agency head, the Director of Human Resources, and the City Solicitor.

If the public servant has still failed to file the required statement **60 days** after the due date, the Ethics Board may refer the matter to the public servant's agency head, the Director of Human Resources, and the City Solicitor with a recommendation that the public servant be suspended without pay until they file the statement. The suspension provision does not apply to elected officials.

The bill further provides that the Ethics Board may assess a late fee of \$10 per day, up to \$1000 total, for failing to submit the statement by the required date. Public servants may ask the Board to waive the late fee for good cause within 30 days after the assessment.

Other Changes

In addition to the changes discussed above, the bill amends Article 8 of the Baltimore City Code to:

- Require new appointees and the official providing the appointee with written notice of the appointee's responsibilities under the Ethics Code to sign the notice to evidence receipt and understanding. Within 5 days the signed notice must be placed in the appointee's personnel file and provided to the Ethics Board.
- Provide that, prior to filling a new or vacant position, the agency head must identify
 whether the position will require filing of financial disclosure statements. If so, any
 advertisement of the position must include a statement that financial disclosure
 statements will be required. The agency head must also provide the name and position
 number of the appointee to the Ethics Board within 10 days of filling the position.
- Change the deadlines for agency heads and the Director of Human Resources to submit the names and position numbers of all public servants who are required to file financial disclosure statements to the Ethics Board from February 28 and March 15, respectively, to January 1 and February 1, respectively.


