A COUNCIL RESOLUTION CONCERNING

Historically Black Colleges and Universities Settlement 1 FOR the purpose of supporting the ruling of the U.S. District Court for the District of Maryland 2 3 and the offer made by the Historically Black Colleges and Universities Coalition regarding the lawsuit against the State and urging Governor Hogan and the General Assembly to settle 4 the Coalition lawsuit in accordance with the Court ruling and the offer made by the Coalition. 5 Recitals 6 WHEREAS, The State of Maryland has four Historically Black Colleges and Universities 7 8 ("HBCUs"), two of which are geographically located in Baltimore City and a third is situated within the greater Baltimore metropolitan region; and 9 10 WHEREAS, HBCUs are an integral part of the Maryland higher education enterprise and provide educational opportunities for a large segment of the population of Baltimore City and 11 produce a continuing supply of teachers for the Baltimore public school system; and 12 WHEREAS, HBCUs serve as economic engines in their communities by employing scores of 13 Baltimore residents and contributing enormously to the economy of the City through the revenue 14 15 generated by these institutions and the expenditures made by students, faculty, staff, and 16 supporters; and WHEREAS, The HBCUs are major players in the social and cultural life of the City with their 17 artifacts, athletic programs, unique lecture series, and other special events; and 18 WHEREAS, A coalition of HBCU students, alumni, faculty, and friends sued the State of 19 20 Maryland in 2006, to combat segregation perpetrated by the State; and 21 WHEREAS, The U.S. District Court for the District of Maryland ruled in 2013 that the State 22 had done great harm to the HBCUs because of its unconstitutional and discriminatory practice of allowing unnecessary duplication of academic programs by non-HBCU colleges and universities; 23 and 24 WHEREAS, The District Court ordered in 2017 that the State remedy the violation by 25 establishing at each of the HBCUs a set of unique, high demand programs with appropriate 26 27 funding for scholarships, marketing, and recruitment; and

WHEREAS, The HBCU Coalition recently offered to settle the case for \$577 million over a
 10-year period; and

6	WHEREAS, We need a fully funded and supported Morgan State University; and
7 8 9 10	WHEREAS , We affirm, based on the District Court ruling, that Coppin State University was discriminated against more than others, and we call for the immediate dispersal of funding by the State so Coppin State University can begin to rebuild and return to its successful track record of educating thousands of Baltimoreans; and
11 12	WHEREAS , We affirm that we are opposed to the proposal to create the City University of Baltimore which would have a negative impact on Coppin State University; and
13 14	WHEREAS , We further affirm that we stand with alumni, students, faculty, staff, and the community and pledge our allegiance to Coppin State University as it currently is constituted.
15 16 17 18 19	NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF BALTIMORE , That the City Council supports the ruling of the U.S. District Court for the District of Maryland and the offer made by the Historically Black Colleges and Universities Coalition regarding the lawsuit against the State and urges Governor Hogan and the General Assembly to settle the Coalition lawsuit in accordance with the Court ruling and the offer made by the Coalition.
