Recitals

Baltimore has been home to many film and television show productions. Over 70 films and television shows have been shot in Maryland since 2000. Many of these productions have been filmed specifically in Baltimore. Television shows like Veep and House of Cards were at least partially shot in Baltimore, as well as films like Step Up and Live Free or Die Hard. Baltimore works very well as a stand-in for Washington DC, which due to security concerns is frequently difficult for companies to film in. Television shows and movies that are filmed in Baltimore advertise our City's beauty to potential visitors around the world. In addition, these large productions provide jobs for City residents. The Baltimore City Council is interested in learning more about the current status and future potential of the film industry in Baltimore.

To promote film and television production in Maryland, the State provides Film Production Activity Tax Credits. For Fiscal Year 2020, the tax credit amount is \$11 million; for 2021 the amount is \$14 million; for 2022 the amount is \$17 million; and for 2023 the amount is \$20 million, and will remain at \$20 million for subsequent years. There is a 10% carve-out for independent Maryland productions. 

My name is Debbie Dorsey and I am the Director of the Baltimore Film Office at the Baltimore Office of Promotion & the Arts. The Baltimore Film Office is the official liaison between filmmakers and city agencies, businesses, crew and communities and markets Baltimore as a first class location for film production.

Baltimore City has had a film office since 1979. Cities, states and countries create film offices for the purpose of economic development. While we take pride in seeing our city on the screen, we also take pride in the job creation and the enormous economic impact this industry brings to our city and state.

From 2011-2019 the film industry created an economic impact of over ONE BILLION DOLLARS in Maryland, with over 75% of that in Baltimore City. These productions range from major television series and feature films on one end to student films on the other with indies, commercials, documentaries, web series and music videos in between. During this same period, 20,000 Marylanders were hired. The Motion Picture Association of America estimates an average movie or television show spends \$250,000 dollars a day on location, much of this is for local salaries- the film industry creates opportunities for a diverse workforce to include accountants, truck drivers, camera, grip and electric crew, local actors and extras, office staff, wardrobe, hair and makeup, security... these jobs are well paying jobs with benefits.

Between 2011-2019 approximately 18,000 Maryland businesses were supported, since 2012 over 3,657 Baltimore City businesses benefited from the film industry. The industry supports a variety of businesses such as hotels, car, truck and equipment rentals, lumber, paint, fabric and furniture stores.

Currently, the program is tapped out, and we are turning productions away. In order to maintain and grow the industry, an increase is the annual available tax credit amount is necessary.



The Department of Finance is herein reporting on City Council Bill 19-0168R, Growing the Film Industry in Baltimore, the purpose of which is to discuss the film industry in Baltimore City and the pursuit of increasing the Film Production Activity Tax Credit to maintain and grow the film industry in Baltimore City.

Background

The State of Maryland currently offers the Film Production Activity Tax Credit for entities completing production activities in Maryland, which is funded by the state corporate income tax. Qualified entities may receive a refundable income tax credit of up to 25% and 27% for direct costs for film and television production activities, respectively, with a maximum credit of \$10,000,000 per project. In Fiscal 2018, House of Cards received a tax credit for the fifth season of approximately \$7 million and had an estimated economic impact of over \$129 million for the State.

Fiscal Impact

Since the Film Production Activity Tax Credit is funded by the state corporate income tax, it does not have a direct impact on City funds. However, television and film productions within the City can generate minimal revenue through hotel tax, permitting fees, and engagement in the local business economy. The Department of Finance is unable to provide exact revenue impacts for the City, but the Regional Economic Studies Institute of Towson University released a report in 2014 stating that "for every dollar claimed in film tax credits, Maryland gains \$1.03 in total tax revenues and \$3.69 in economic output".


Conclusion

The Film Production Activity Tax Credit provides qualified entities a refundable income tax credit for direct costs of film and television production activities completed in Maryland. Film and television production activity in the State, and Baltimore City specifically, generates tax revenue and increased economic outputs that benefits residents through increased business and employment opportunities, as well as other state and local taxes and fees.

For the reasons stated above, the Department of Finance does not oppose City Council Bill 19-0168R.

Analysis

Background

Film Production Activity is the production of a film or video project that is intended for nationwide commercial distribution; and for television series, or each season of the television series. Film Production Activity includes the production of a feature film, television project, commercial, corporate film, or a music video. The Maryland Film Production Activity Tax Credit Program (Tax General Article 10-730) was amended in 2018 by Senate Bill 1154.

The bill authorizes \$8,000,000 in credits for fiscal year 2019, \$11,000,000 in credits for fiscal year 2020, \$14,000,000 in credits for fiscal year 2021, \$17,000,000 in credits for fiscal year 2022, and \$20,000,000 in credits for fiscal year 2023 and each fiscal year thereafter.

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


