Dear Budget Appropriations Committee:

I write this letter expressing concern regarding the requested \$13.5 million increase for police funding which would bring the current budget of \$536,376,477 to 549,959,519. This request is confounding, given that the Baltimore City Police Department (BCPD) consumed an estimated 31% of the city budget in FY 20, with little to show for the increase aside from increases in crime, homicide and continued lawsuits filed against the department. I urge members of this committee to reflect on what return on investment of the \$550 million Baltimore City taxpayers can expect from BCPD. If the past five years are a lesson, a decrease in homicide, violent crime or even an improvement in police performance - with less force and more de-escalation tactics employed - cannot be anticipated from this increase. The FY2021 budget recommends more than \$80 million in risk management services to address the poor performance of the BCPD that does not bring forth outcomes which support progress in Baltimore. It behooves BCPD to focus on how to save the city money, not waste it. The FY2021 preliminary budget states:

"The Baltimore Police Department will increase the number of available officers in Fiscal 2021, with a goal of hiring 240 recruits. The Department regularly has approximately 200 officer vacancies, hindering its

ability to fight crime and negatively impacting officer wellness."

Fighting and preventing crime requires a more holistic approach that addresses the social circumstances plaguing Baltimore from rampant poverty to a lack of access to economic opportunities for African Americans to the desperation that so many people feel as a result of a city that perennially prioritizes the need to a broken policing and criminal justice system over their own needs. The COVID-19 pandemic makes every city resource more critical, more vital, more precious - requiring more intentionality on how we allocate funds to support the city's recovery. I ask BCPD support Baltimore's recovery - not just considering the financial situation taking place across the nation, but in solidarity for the massive protest calling for more balanced city budgets which prioritize the needs of their residents over dysfunctional policing practices.

Instead of increasing the BCPD budget, use these funds to support essential city services and departments from the Baltimore City Health Department (BDHD) to Baltimore City Public Schools (BCPS) which remain grossly underfunded. Support proven crime reduction programs such as Safe Streets (\$2M) or the Trauma-Informed Care work of BCHD through their ReCAST program (\$2M). Support one of the many plans published in the city that remain unfunded - such as the Department of Public Works' (DPW) Less Waste Better Baltimore Plan (\$7M) suggesting savings the city could reap by transitioning to a smarter, more sustainable waste management practices such as composting and increased recycling. Fund the 2019 Baltimore Sustainability Plan (\$2.5M), drafted in collaboration with thousands of Baltimore City residents to address environmental injustices across the city.

I thank the committee for their time and consideration.

This request is confounding, given that the Baltimore City Police Department (BCPD) consumed an estimated 31% of the city budget in FY 20, with little to show for the increase aside from increases in crime, homicide and continued lawsuits filed against the department. I urge members of this committee to reflect on what return on investment of the \$550 million Baltimore City taxpayers can expect from BCPD. If the past five years are a lesson, a decrease in homicide, violent crime or even an improvement in police performance - with less force and more de-escalation tactics employed - cannot be anticipated from this increase. The FY2021 budget recommends more than \$80 million in risk management services to address the poor performance of the BCPD that does not bring forth outcomes which support progress in Baltimore. It behooves BCPD to focus on how to save the city money, not waste it. The FY2021 preliminary budget states:

"The Baltimore Police Department will increase the number of available officers in Fiscal 2021, with a goal of hiring 240 recruits. The Department regularly has approximately 200 officer vacancies, hindering its ability to fight crime and negatively impacting officer wellness."

Fighting and preventing crime requires a more holistic approach that addresses the social circumstances plaguing Baltimore from rampant poverty to a lack of access to economic opportunities for African Americans to the desperation that so many people feel as a result of a city that perennially prioritizes the need to a broken policing and criminal justice system over their own needs. The COVID-19 pandemic makes every city resource more critical, more vital, more precious - requiring more intentionality on how we allocate funds to support the city's recovery. I ask BCPD support Baltimore's recovery - not just considering the financial situation taking place across the nation, but in solidarity for the massive protest calling for more balanced city budgets which prioritize the needs of their residents over dysfunctional policing practices.

Instead of increasing the BCPD budget, use these funds to support essential city services and departments from the Baltimore City Health Department (BDHD) to Baltimore City Public Schools (BCPS) which remain grossly underfunded. Support proven crime reduction programs such as Safe Streets (\$2M) or the Trauma-Informed Care work of BCHD through their ReCAST program (\$2M). Support one of the many plans published in the city that remain unfunded - such as the Department of Public Works' (DPW) Less Waste Better Baltimore Plan (\$7M) suggesting savings the city could reap by transitioning to a smarter, more sustainable waste management practices such as composting and increased recycling. Fund the 2019 Baltimore Sustainability Plan (\$2.5M), drafted in collaboration with thousands of Baltimore City residents to address environmental injustices across the city.

I thank the committee for their time and consideration.

I am writing to submit the testimony below for the Budget & Appropriations Committee hearing on 6/12. Thank you so much for your attention.

Dear Mayor Young, Council President Scott, Budget & Appropriations Chair Costello, and other members of the City Council,

I am writing to urge you in the strongest terms to not increase the budget of the Baltimore Police Department, as currently proposed in the FY21 budget, and instead to decrease it. All other city agency budgets are based on outcome-budgeting, i.e. on performance. Yet the Baltimore Police Department's budget is clearly not, otherwise it would have been de-funded long ago.

BPD is so corrupt that not a single member of the Department elevated the bad actions of the Gun Trace Task Force to public notice, despite numerous complaints from residents over the course of years; it took a police officer from the county to alert the federal government to the problem. BPD is so corrupt that once the federal government did step in, they mandated sweeping changes in response to systemic violations of the constitutional rights of Baltimore's citizenry, most of which have not yet been implemented. BPD is so corrupt that Detective Sean Suiter was shot in the head the day before he could testify against GTTF, and other "good apple" cops willing to speak out, like Detective Larry Smith (https://theappeal.org/authors/larry-smith/), have been forced to leave the department.

Throwing more money at this broken department will not improve things. Only a complete changeover from the old system to a new one will do that. We need local police control, and then we need to dismantle and completely remake BPD. Camden, NJ disbanded their police department and started over from scratch, lowering both costs and their murder rate. We can do the same.

For now, cutting the bloat in the BPD budget is, at least, in our grasp. These funds are desperately needed for other vital city functions that are now at risk due to the costs of COVID-19. Other cities, like Los Angeles and Minneapolis, are defunding their police departments at the same time that we are looking backwards and preparing to expand ours. This cannot stand, not in a city that has the same or a worse track record in policing than any other in the country, both in terms of abuses by our police and in terms of their ineffectiveness in stopping community violence. We must join the powerful wave of this moment and defund the Baltimore Police Department.

While the protests in Baltimore have been peaceful, that does not mean we will stand by while you agree to give the entity we are so strongly protesting more money while cutting other vital programs that are already underfunded.

As a resident of Baltimore City, I urge you to defund BPD and put that money into forming highly trained crisis teams. Affordable Housing, Housing and Community Development, Homeless Prevention and Support Services for the Homeless, Outreach to the Homeless, and Youth and Trauma Services.

There is ample evidence that police involvement increases the potential for violence (which I could provide upon your request). I have been in situations where I needed to petition an individual with mental health issues to the hospital, and in those situations, police have been involved. This is highly unnecessary and often very counterproductive and traumatizing. Having an appropriately trained crisis team to deal with these scenarios would be much more beneficial to everyone involved.

I urge you to hear the thousands of residents that are filling the streets demanding change and not only vote against the proposed BPD FY 2020-21 budget but also work towards providing our residents with evidence based practices and treating everyone equitably.

Unconscionable poverty, segregation, and vast suffering - particularly of the Black population - have continued unmitigated in Baltimore for many decades. These facts alone should be sufficient evidence that default policing and carceral "solutions" do not solve underlying problems. It has long been the consensus in the research community that policing does not help reduce crime or protect citizens. Felony arrests constitute a small percentage of police activity; the majority of on-duty time is spent harassing and intimidating poor citizens of color for traffic violations, drug, and property offenses. Baltimore citizens are in desperate need of social services and crime is a conspicuous symptom of this.

The proposed BPD FY21 Budget significantly increases the police budget over last year's and makes reductions to precisely those areas of the budget that are proven to reduce crime by investing in the community. It is shocking to observe the proposed expansion of the BPD FY21 Budget at a time when the public has never been more aware of the systemic nature of excessive use of force, gross incompetence, racism, corruption, and disrespect towards citizens in the institution of policing. 
