My name is Aiko, and I was born and raised in Baltimore City. I'm writing to ask the Baltimore City Council to vote against the proposed FY21 Baltimore Police Department budget increase, and instead work to implement significant and permanent reductions to this department. These funds should be routed toward the development of harm reduction systems that do not terrorize our neighbors and communities.

Because the City Council is only able to cut rather than reallocate funds, I urge you to commit to cutting the BPD budget. It is, however, within the power of the mayor to propose a new budget, and so I ask you, Mayor Young, to ethically reallocate this increase, as well as a meaningful portion of the remaining BPD budget, towards social services and education.

Though I know you are aware of this, the proposed BPD FY21 Budget is \$549,959,519. This is an increase of \$13,583,042 compared to FY20. The Budget also calls for cuts to several departments that better serve the public, including:

Affordable Housing (-\$3,535,819)

Housing and Community Development (-\$227,023)

Homeless Prevention and Support Services for the Homeless (-\$641,270)

Outreach to the homeless (-\$1,971,541)

Enoch Pratt Free Library (-\$350,000)

Youth and Trauma Services (-\$10,749)

Board of Elections (-\$190,470)

Environmental Inspection Services (-\$50,243)

Chronic Disease Prevention (-\$252,906)

Park programs and events (-\$122,912)

Public right of way cleaning (-\$686,806)

Events Art Culture and Films (-\$442,488)

I call on the City Council to cancel the BPD budget increase of \$13.5 million and the mayor to allocate it to the above departments.

Investment in these departments and other social services shows our commitment to communities and the vision that all Baltimore residents deserve to thrive. Historically, the city government has spent far more on police than on public health, homeless services, youth services, and other vital agencies. Additionally, all other city agency budgets are based on outcome-budgeting and performance, yet the Baltimore Police Department's budget is clearly not; otherwise it would have been defunded long ago.

Giving BPD more money will not be productive for our city. We need a completely new system. We desperately need local police control, followed by dismantling and completely remaking the department. Camden, NJ disbanded their police department and started over from scratch, lowering both costs and their murder rate. We can do the same.

In the meantime, we do have control over the funding of BPD, and it is entirely feasible to cut their budget if our city council and mayor are actually committed to creating change in Baltimore. As stated before, these funds are desperately needed for other vital city functions, especially due to the costs of COVID-19. We are even seeing other cities such as Los Angeles and Minneapolis currently setting a precedent for defunding their police department. We have no excuse for increasing our BPD budget, especially given their horrific track record as one of the most abusive and ineffective in the country. We must join the movement, be leaders of change, and defund the Baltimore Police Department.

My name is Dr. Jonathan Schettino. I am a psychologist practicing in downtown Baltimore and serve on Johns Hopkins University's Risk Assessment Team. I have also been a proud resident of Baltimore City over the past 6 years.

As the City Council considers next year's budget and reevaluates the role that the police play in our city, I am demanding that funding for the Baltimore Police Department be substantially reduced and diverted to other services that can more effectively address many of the public safety issues in our city. For decades, Baltimore has relied too heavily on its police force to perform jobs that police are ill-equipped to perform. A large amount of arrests in our city are linked to homelessness, substance use disorders, and untreated severe mental illness. The police are not social workers, addictions treatment counselors, or psychologists, nor should we expect them to be. Moreover, we know that the interventions that the police are trained to apply (e.g., arrest, incarceration, neutralization of violent threats) fail to provide a long-term solution to these problems and all too often increase the likelihood of police misconduct, police injuries, or other undesirable encounters between the police and the community.

Therefore, it is both pro-police and pro-community to significantly reduce police funding and use those funds to substantially increase funding for programs and services that are specifically designed to treat homelessness, substance use disorders, and severe mental illness. These programs could include increased long-term housing options for the homeless, public substance use disorder treatment centers, public community mental health clinics, funding for more beds at state psychiatric hospitals, and mobile mental health crisis response units. These programs would undoubtedly address dangers to public safety attributable to homelessness, substance use disorders, and severe mental illness, thereby freeing up police to perform the jobs for which they were trained. This is a win-win solution for police and the community and should be enacted in the FY 2020-2021 budget.




