Fall Reopening Plan

Starting all Virtual



All schools in the district will open the 2020-2021 school year virtually

We will assess the need to prioritize certain small groups of students for in-person instruction during the virtual learning period and for the addition of the hybrid model later in the fall

Transition to add the Hybrid Model

Families will have the option to transition to hybrid model or continue with a virtual learning model

We will provide time to transition to hybrid in-person learning and opportunities to train and orient staff, families, and students to what the experience will be like for those who choose that option

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We will reassess our ability to add the hybrid model as conditions allow later in the fall. Transition to hybrid learning may look like:

Virtual instruction option continues:

Virtual instruction will continue to be offered to all families who do not feel comfortable returning their students to school in-person

Adding the Hybrid Model

 Ensuring our most struggling students come back first (eg. students who have not engaged well in the virtual space; students far behind in reading and math; English Learners; and/or students with

Particular grades may come back first, such as PK, K, 1st, 6th, and 9th (transition grades and youngest learners)

 All students come back in an AA / BB schedule format

Baltimore City's Digital Divide

The American Community Survey (2018) suggests the following about the digital divide in Baltimore:

- 96,000 households in Baltimore (40.7%) did not have wireline internet service, such as cable, fiber, or digital subscriber line service.
- 75,000 Baltimore City households, or one in three, do not have either a desktop or laptop computer.
- 19,200 households with children in the city do not have wireline broadband at home, or 34.7% of such households.
- Nearly 20,000 households with children under the age of 17 do not have wireline broadband or computers at home.

Y| h **Goals: Device Distribution and Internet Access** • To provide devices and internet access to as many students who require these supports.

- To distribute 65,000 student devices and 5,000 staff devices.

Continually Analyzing Need

- We estimate that there are approximately 20,000 students who do not have internet access.
- We experienced an internet and device survey response rate of 48%.
- Principals and school communities are continuing to survey families to understand clear needs for devices and internet access.

Overview: Device Distribution

- About 70,000 devices will be available for staff and students.
- Approximately 25,000 devices and 3,000 hotspots have been distributed to City Schools students.
- We plan to distribute 10,000+ more devices before the beginning of the school year, Sept. 8th.
- Further orders have been placed and we expect that approximately 20,000 devices will be available for distribution by mid-September.

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

Comcast Strategy

- City Schools is planning to enter into a sponsorship agreement with Comcast to ensure that City Schools students have access to the Internet for virtual learning.
- City Schools expects to sponsor up to 7,000 households that have signed on for Internet Essentials to ensure continuation of service.
- State resources will be utilized to support this sponsorship agreement through December 31st. Raising funds to support families who have been connected through Comcast Internet Essentials beyond December 31st.
- Comcast has agreed to guarantee service levels of at least 25 mbps download and 3 mbps upload with 1 to 3 simultaneous users.
- Working through other contract items with Comcast e.g., service window for installation for any new Internet Essential customers, collection of data.





T-Mobile Strategy



- We have distributed 3,000 hotspots from T-Mobile, and will be distributing 12,000 additional hotspots along with devices in the coming weeks.
- Through state funding, we have covered this cost through December 31st. We hope to extend the service on the T Mobile hotspots from January to August 2021 with fundraising efforts.
- City School is looking into including charter schools under our T-Mobile contract to support them in their purchase of hotspots under the same terms.

Mesh Network Strategy

 City Schools partnered with the Digital Harbor Foundation to implement a mesh network pilot (Project Waves) in four school neighborhoods: Lakeland, James McHenry, John Rurah and Baybrook.

> • As a result of this pilot, 68 families have access to internet free of cost for 5 years.

• District leadership is working with the Project Waves team to investigate long term mesh network implementation.
