Major Issues Discussed

- 1. The Chairman thanked Councilman Cohen for introducing the Resolution and stated, "This is a very importance issue."
- 2. Councilman Cohen gave opening remarks. Some highlights of his conversation were:
 - The system is broken for how we handle mental health issues
 - Talked about some of the issues pertaining to mental health
 - Is excited to hear from people today on this issue
 - Today is a start on how we can do better on this issue
- 3. Testimony was received from several city agency representations, speakers and organizations. Some highlights of their conversations were:
 - Three (3) speakers talked about some of their <u>life experiences</u>:
 - o Talked about an issue concerning a friend who was mentally unstable and the encounter he/she experienced with police officers
 - o Is the parent of special needs children; talked about some of the experiences his family had whenever police officer(s) had to be called to their address; (the son was traumatized and reacts differently whenever he sees an officer; he is terrified of police officers)
 - o Has three (3) daughters between the ages of 17 to 37 years
 - 1. Have long term experience with mentally ill people
 - 2. Child became severely depressed and was a victim of a severe trauma event
 - 3. The trauma associated with her child affects her too!
 - 4. Talked about how the child interacted with police officers
 - About how police officers' responses
 - About some of the negative attitudes officers have when dealing with those with mental illness
 - o Concerns:
 - Lack of equity and access
 - Hard to get the help needed
 - o Police Officers are not social workers and don't have the background to deal with those with mental health issues
 - Need affordable treatment
 - Should not have to depend on police officers to deal with mental health issues
 - o Trauma and lack of service available is of grave concern
 - Hurt people hurt other people!

- A representative from **Disability Rights Maryland** testified:
 - o Talked about the background of the Office
 - o There is a lack of community based services for those with disabilities; thereby many are placed in jails or mental facilities
 - o Goal is to prevent re-institutionalization
 - o What he brings to the table is the importance of value
 - o Concern: Having to depend on Police Officers to deal with those with mental illnesses issues
 - o Consultation with students is needed
 - o More crises services needed
 - o More trauma informed practices needed
 - Adequate discharge services needed
 - We must be accountable for the communities we served by having more and better services available
 - o The Mobile Crises Team is available 24 hours/7 days a week

• Two (2) Doctors testified:

- o Are mental health professions
- o Here today to talk about what is needed to make things better
- o Talked about:
 - 1. Emergency Department
 - 2. Emergency Partitions
- o Talked about what an emergency partition entails:
 - 1. How to file
 - 2. Who can file
 - 3. Partition must be signed off by a judge
- o Talked about what the Emergency Departments does:
 - 1. Transports
 - 2. The people who are bought in mostly come on a non-voluntary basis
 - 3. How clients are evaluated and how they are discharged
 - 4. Talked about how long an emergency partition lasts
 - must make sure a Judge signed off on partition
 - 6. Talked about the screening processes
 - 7. Evaluations
 - o Types of mental illnesses
 - o Can't confine individuals against his/her will unless it is a criminal situation
 - o Homelessness some cases are associated with mental health issues
 - o Talked about some of the laws on the books
 - o Police are not mental health specialists
 - o Live ammunition should not be used on those with mental health issues
 - o Need increased resources; a data collection system and increased education training
 - o Most changes made will need to be made on the State level
- <u>Committee/councilmembers</u> made comments and asked questions. Some were:
 - o The processes used for Intake follow-up, is this a universal process used across the state of Maryland?
 - o Concern: Challenges associated when clients/patients are discarded

- 1. Lack of basic humanity
- 2. Lack of continuum of care
- 3. After the partition(s) is closed out, what type of services are available? Response: The Maryland Psychiatric Society is a good resource for the City to look into
- Several representatives from the **Police Department** testified:
 - We must be a call for services and community
 - o We support the recommendations made today and looks forward to changes
 - We don't want to criminalize those with these challenges
 - Talked about training provided by the Department
 - o There is a significant influx of calls associated with mental health issues
 - o Talked about the Department's policies as it relates to the Consent Decree and to behavioral disabilities
 - o Talked about some of their partnerships
 - o Comments about the Department's responsibility to deescalate situations
- Councilman Cohen made the following comments:
 - o It feels like more of the work on this issue is police-driven
 - o A Police having to response in these situations is not the right response
- A representative from the **Behavioral Health System Baltimore** testified:
 - o Gave a PowerPoint Presentation a copy is on file
 - o Comment: Society is trained to call the police for all issues!
 - Society is asking our police to do too much!
 - o Talked about the mission, goals, core functions of the Behavioral Health System Baltimore (an overview)
- A representative from the <u>National Alliance on Mental Illness Metropolitan</u> Baltimore testified:
 - o Talked about the duties of the organization
 - Comment: Values the partnership the organization have with the Police Department
- A representative from the <u>Mayor's Office of Family and Children</u> Success/Human Services testified:
 - o Comment: This meeting/conversation was a much needed conversation
 - o Talked about and gave statistical data regarding mental health/illnesses in Baltimore City
- Councilman Cohen asked the representative to, "describe where your work with youths is going." Response: We are focusing on healing and resiliency, such as mentoring. We also need a continuum of care.
- A Licensed Social Worker testified:
 - o There has been a lot of conversation here today but not many social workers are in attendance
 - o Concerns:
 - 1. Lack of access for treatment
 - 2. Issue also affects Social Workers due to high turnover
 - 3. More oversight is needed after clients are released
 - 4. Would hope that more ambulatory services become available to handle more of the calls

- o Talked about an experience she had pertaining to getting an emergency partition
- 4. The chairman thanked everyone for attending and stated, "This is an extremely pressing issue. I look forward to continuing this conversation."
