Baltimore City Code – Article 1, Subtitle 1-City Council, Section 1-6

§ 1-6. Agencies to provide legislative information.

It shall be the duty of the head of every City department or bureau established by the Baltimore City Charter or by ordinance to provide all technical materials, plats, drawings, and information that are requested by any member or the President of the City Council for the purpose of introducing legislation into the Council. (City Code, 1976/83, art. 1, §6.) (Ord. 76-080.)

INTRODUCTION

The Baltimore Development Corporation (BDC) is reporting on City Council Bill No. 21-0026R introduced by Councilmembers Porter, Conway, Bullock, McCray, Ramos, Torrence, Stokes, Middleton, Cohen, Glover.

PURPOSE

For the purpose of inviting representatives from the Baltimore Development Corporation to brief the City Council on their efforts to support small businesses and economic development in light of the COVID-19 pandemic.

BRIEF HISTORY

This Resolution will enable BDC representatives to report on assistance provided to Baltimore City businesses throughout the COVID-19 pandemic. BDC's COVID-19 response is comprised of four main components: outreach, information, collaboration, and action. At the outset of the pandemic, BDC launched an outreach survey to assemble information on impacted businesses. This initial survey grew into a formal collaboration with 19 organizations to create a Technical Assistance Network that continues to be accessed by small businesses seeking help on a range of issues, including the Payroll Protection Program (PPP). BDC led the distribution of federal CARES Act and Maryland Relief Act funds related to small businesses. BDC learned from other early grant programs that in order to create an equitable grant, funds must be awarded based on equitable criteria and that funds must not be provided on a *First-come*, *First-serve* basis. BDC has issued two small business grant rounds and one restaurant grant round (the final fourth round is in the review stage). In total, BDC awarded 1,085 Baltimore businesses totaling approximately \$15 million to date. BDC's work to support small businesses, particularly businesses owned by people of color, has been recognized nationally for its innovation and inclusiveness.

The Department of Finance is herein reporting on City Council Bill 21-0026R, Investigative Hearing-COVID-19 and Small Business Re-Openings, the purpose of which is to invite the Baltimore Development Corporation (BDC) to provide information on efforts to support small businesses and economic development during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The COVID-19 pandemic has greatly impacted the national, State, and local economies, with many businesses and workers struggling to adapt to the changing health guidelines and restrictions from federal State, and local authorities. In addition, as COVID-19 has continued, the impact has been felt most by small businesses and low-wage workers. Based on employment data from the Maryland Department of Labor, Baltimore City's leisure and hospitality sector saw a 53% reduction in employment, or 16,279 jobs, in the second quarter of 2020 compared to the second quarter of 2019. In the 2019 State of Downtown report from the Downtown Partnership of Baltimore, 94% of businesses surveyed in the downtown area reported being impacted by COVID-19 and 80% of surveyed businesses reported concern about the impact to their operations.

In March 2020, the City received \$103.6 million as part of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act. These funds were used to support costs for the City response to COVID-19, as well as provide community economic support. BDC received \$9.8 million in CARES Act funds for small business support, which provided \$7.5 million in grants to cover a variety of COVID-19 related expenses, \$1.5 million to support the safe re-opening of businesses through Design for Distancing, and \$500,000 in grants to support local manufacturing of personal protective equipment.

Since October 2020, the City has also received nearly \$10.6 million from the State to provide grants specifically to the restaurant industry. BDC also managed this program on behalf of the City, which provided restaurants with grants for operating expenses, infrastructure improvements, and COVID-19 related expenses. The City is expected to receive an additional \$2 million from the State for this purpose and an additional \$50,000 to assist businesses develop online sales and telework infrastructure, for a total of over \$22.4 million distributed to small businesses by BDC since March 2020.

Additional City funded grant programs related to small business include nearly \$10 million in hotel relief managed by Visit Baltimore and \$250,000 for the City's 8 Main Streets organization managed by the Baltimore Civic Fund.

The Department of Finance will attend the hearing for this Resolution and respond to any fiscal inquiries.

6	Recitals
7	COVID-19 has had a significant impact on Baltimore's economy, especially the small
8	business community. The Baltimore Development Corporation ("BDC") is the City's economic
9	development agency. BDC has led the City's response and recovery effort with respect to the
10	economic crisis brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic.
11	BDC has strived to deliver an innovative and equitable response to help local business
12	through the pandemic and has emphasized supporting resident-, women- and Black, Indigenous
13	and People of Color (BIPOC)-owned businesses. BDC's efforts have been recognized both
14	locally and nationally.
15	To date, BDC has awarded over 1,000 small business assistance grants totaling
16	approximately \$13 million. Sixty-three percent of all small business assistance grants were
17	awarded to BIPOC-owned businesses; 57% of all small business assistance grants were awarded
18	to women-owned businesses; and 66% of all small business assistance grants were award to
19	Baltimore City resident-owned businesses.

Council Bill 21-0026R

With the enget of the COVID 10 pendemic DDC and the Politimere Small Pusiness Support
With the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, BDC and the Baltimore Small Business Support
Fund ("BSBSF") partnered to ensure relief resources reached as many businesses as possible and
especially BIPOC-owned businesses in disinvested neighborhoods. This partnership formed the
Baltimore Small Business Technical Assistance Network ("TA Network"), a partnership of 19
organizations coordinated by BDC and funded by the BSBSF coalition of foundations. To date,
the TA Network has more than 1,400 business tracked in its shared database. Sixty percent of
the businesses are BIPOC-owned and 80% of the businesses are sole proprietors or have five or
fewer employees.

As BDC addresses the current economic crisis, the agency is also undertaking a robust economic strategic planning effort. BDC recently released an interim report on its Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy named "Baltimore Together – A Platform for Inclusive Prosperity". This effort describes the BDC will take to promote inclusive economic recovery and growth in the City over the next 5 years.

Now, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF BALTIMORE, That the City Council invites representatives from the Baltimore Development Corporation to brief the City Council on their efforts to support small businesses and economic development in light of the COVID-19 pandemic.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of this Resolution be sent to the Mayor, the President and CEO of the Baltimore Development Corporation, and the Mayor's Legislative Liaison to the City Council.
