Purpose:

For the purpose of inviting the Acting Director of the Mayor's Office of Homeless Services, the Director of the Mayor's Office of Children and Family Success, the City Administrator, the Acting Commissioner of the Department of Housing and Community Development, and the advocacy groups Housing Our Neighbors and Homeless Persons Representation Project to brief and advise the City Council as to: the overall outcomes for neighbors experiencing homelessness who were able to reside in the hotels; what is next for them; assistance for those experiencing homelessness in encampments during the crisis; and the availability of programs to access housing.

Background

The Mayor's Office of Homeless Services (MOHS) implements federal, state, and local policy and best practices in addition to administering and monitoring homeless services grants. According to the MOHS, approximately 2,500 men, women and children are homeless in Baltimore on any given night. MOHS cites four primary factors contributing to homelessness: lack of affordable housing, lack of affordable health care, low incomes and a lack of comprehensive services. Chronic illnesses, including substance abuse disorders and persistent mental illness, and other physical disabilities create additional challenges in resolving homelessness.

In late March 2020, at the beginning of the pandemic, Baltimore City moved certain groups of homeless people into hotels in order to provide sheltering in compliance with CDC guidelines and allow for the safe quarantine of people testing positive for COVID-19. Currently, Baltimore holds lease agreements with two motels and four hotels, which collectively provide shelter and support services to more than 600 people — most of whom are older adults and/or have underlying health conditions that make them particularly COVID vulnerable. The current leasing model is not a sustainable long-term solution. The City is seeking possible alternative options.

Bill 21-0028R invites the following representatives to brief and advise the City Council about the outcomes of residents that were allowed to reside in hotels during the pandemic.

A COUNCIL RESOLUTION concerning 1 Informational Hearing - Baltimore's Plan for our Neighbors Experiencing 2 Homelessness and Residing in Hotels during the Pandemic 3 4 FOR the purpose of inviting the Acting Director of the Mayor's Office of Homeless Services, the 5 Director of the Mayor's Office of Children and Family Success, the City Administrator, the Acting Commissioner of the Department of Housing and Community Development, and the 6 advocacy groups Housing Our Neighbors and Homeless Persons Representation Project to 7 brief and advise the City Council as to: the overall outcomes for neighbors experiencing 8 homelessness who were able to reside in the hotels; what is next for them; assistance for 9 10 those experiencing homelessness in encampments during the crisis; and the availability of programs to access housing. 11 Recitals 12 WHEREAS, the COVID-19 pandemic is a serious health crisis in our City, State, and Nation; 13 WHEREAS, the Mayor's Office of Homeless Services has housed over 500 of our neighbors 14 experiencing homelessness in local hotels to allow some to recover from COVID as well as to 15 protect others from COVID; 16 17 WHEREAS, many more of our neighbors experiencing homelessness need protection from the ongoing crisis and need access to stable housing; 18 19 WHEREAS, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) may reimburse cities for temporary hotel stays for our neighbors experiencing homelessness now and throughout the 20 health crisis; an 21 22 WHEREAS, there is interest for the public and the City Council to be briefed on the plan for our neighbors experiencing homelessness both in hotels and in encampments to be stably housed. 23
