**Position: Oppose** 

The Department of Finance is herein reporting on City Council Bill 21-0103 - Suicide Prevention Coordinator, the purpose of which is to establish the position and duties of a Suicide Prevention Coordinator within the Baltimore City Health Department.

## **Background**

Suicide is the tenth leading cause of death in the United States and has increased by 33% between 1999 and 2019<sup>1</sup>, and over 15 million Americans have either seriously thought, planned, or attempted suicide in 2019<sup>2</sup>. One strategy to suicide prevention is crisis prevention. This approach provides support and referral services, typically by connecting a person in crisis to trained volunteers or professional staff via telephone hotline, online chat, text messaging, or in-person. A crisis prevention hotline is the most common strategy used in Baltimore City and all other Maryland counties3, with the exception of Baltimore County, which uses a mobile crisis team along with their crisis hotline. Specially-trained police officers are paired with licensed mental health clinicians in an unmarked police car and wear plain clothes to provide on-site, emergency response to persons in need of crisis intervention.

Additionally, Baltimore City is currently conducting a 911 Diversion Pilot, which diverts 911 calls from individuals with suicidal ideation to trained staff from Baltimore Crisis Response Inc., a vendor contracted with the Behavioral Health System Baltimore.

## **Fiscal Impact**

The Fiscal 2022 Baltimore City Health budget does not have General Funds appropriated to create a new Suicide Prevention Coordinator position. Based on a comparable Maryland State Suicide Prevention Coordinator position<sup>4</sup>, this position creation would cost approximately \$81,500 (\$54,080 salary + \$27,365 OPCs). To make this new position budget neutral, the Health Department would be required to identify an offset in their existing General Fund budget.

## Conclusion

In Fiscal 2022, the City continues to face major fiscal concerns, and the Health Department has dedicated much of its staff and resources to the COVID-19 pandemic response. Therefore, the City cannot presently support the implementation of a new position with General Fund dollars without utilizing resources from other essential services.

For the reasons stated above, the Department of Finance opposes City Council Bill 21-0103.
