Major Issues Discussed

- 1. President Mosby gave opening remarks. Some highlights from his conversation were:
 - o This is a once in a lifetime opportunity to drive our city into the right direction
 - o We must ensure that a sound strategic plan is intact
 - o \$641 million dollars is a lot of money
 - o Our goals and objects are:
 - Ensuring we are moving in the right direction for the residents and communities we serve
 - To review how funds are spent
 - Addressing the needs of the city
- 2. The City Administrator also gave opening remarks. Some highlights from his conversation were:
 - o These funds are a critical lifeline and have specific requirements
 - o There is a timeline for the funds to be spent
 - o Talked about the role of the Office of Recovery Programs and about some of the responsibilities of the staff
 - Quarterly reporting is important and looks forward to continuing discussion as we move toward
- 3. The Finance Director made some comments. Some were:
 - o Have shared the Department's perspective with the Administration on how to address the challenges associated with COVID
 - o Shared why a separate office was set-up to manage the ARPA funds (Office of Recovery Programs)
- 4. The Director for the Mayor's Office of Recovery Programs gave opening remarks and gave a PowerPoint presentation. A copy is on file. Some highlights from her remarks were:
 - o Acknowledged her team and thanked the Mayor for the opportunity to serve in the position
 - o Information regarding the funding is accessible/available
 - o This is an opportunity to restore faith in local government
- 5. Committee/council members asked questions, stated concerns, and made comments. Some highlighted topics of discussion and/or concern were:

Questions

- How does the Budget Stabilization Fund work with the ARPA Funding?
- How many years will the Budget Stabilization Funding be available?
- What happens to the Budget Stabilization Funds if not spent by the deadline date?
- Concern: Services continuing; what happens to these services after the CARES funds are depleted?
- Has any discussion been made to set-a-side any specific amount of the ARPA funds?
- Have any specific decisions been made for any agency(s) and/or Programs for ARPA spending? Answer: No
- What is the expectation on the time for allocation to the agencies? Answer: Sometime during this month; October 2021
- Who are and/or how many members will serve on the Review Committee?

 Answer: Six (6) in total And, who are the external partners serving on the

Committee? Requested by President Mosby: Please provide a list of the committee members to include a list of the external partners.

- Is anyone from the Finance Department setting on the Review Committee?
- The Non-Profit Review Team have this team been established and if so, how many members are there? Answer: No, not yet but soon and will have six (6) members.
- What is the plan for evaluating equity? And will the members (team) be qualified to do same?
- Who is eligible to apply for funds?
- How much money is being allocated to non-profits?
- When will all decisions be finalized for non-profits? Answer: By December 31, 2021
- If an agency(s) is rejected who help those agencies with their needs? Such as getting funds from state and federal levels?
- How much will the new Office of Recovery Programs cost annually during the course of funding? Answer: Office will be in existence for three (3) years and at cost of \$10.6 million
- Why isn't the Office of Recovery Programs being operated in the Planning Department? Concern: Duplication of efforts and resources
- Core City Services
 - o Is there a backlog list for core city services such as illegal dumping requests? If so, is the backlog list prioritized to get things done? Answer: Per Budget Director, will follow-up with OPI and respond back
 - Have any decisions been made for addressing the backlog for core services such as trimming trees?
 - We don't want to reinvent the wheel but instead improve city services; to advance the services of city agencies
 - o Innovation and core services -What weight are you giving to agencies and non-profits?
 - Comments/Concerns: Trees were cut down several years ago, but the tree stumps need to be removed (this backlog is of concern); must deliver better city services
- Proposal amount How did you decide on the \$250,000 amount?
- Slides 13 and 20 in Presentation: Which is the priority; priorities or pillars? Want to make sure everyone is working from the same framework!
- Endorsements
 - What type of power will councilmembers have in the ten (10) endorsements?
- How do we balance new (future funds) federal funds? (Infrastructure funding)
- Virtual Meetings with Non-Profits
 - Requested by Councilwoman Middleton Can we get a list of the non-profits in our districts who attended these meetings? Answer: Per the Director of the Mayor's Office of Recovery Programs, will follow-up with Council on this request
- Applicants

- Requested by Chairman Costello Please provide a list of the ineligible applications for city agencies who were denied and also a list for those who were eligible and denied
- Criteria Used for Scoring Agencies
 - Requested by Councilman Schleifer Can you submit the scoring/results for same?
- Recovery Plan(s) that are submitted to the Federal government
 - o Requested by President Mosby Please make sure the committee/council get copies of this plan and any other plans that are made public
- Revenue Generated Positions
 - What about bringing on extra full time employee positions such as Parking Enforcement Officer; positions that are revenue generated
 - o Is this something we can look into? (Reoccurring revenue positions)
 - Who job is it to identify when additional revenue generated positions are needed? Answer: It is my responsibility; Budget Director
 - Requested by Chairman Costello: Can you put together a list of ten (10) things that we can do to generate revenue?
- Technology/Dashboard
 - Can you walk us through some of the plans you have for informing the public on how funds/projects are being implemented and/or spent?
- Engagement/Training Strategies
 - Is there any additional training available for those who wish to apply for funding?
 - At least one (1) additional virtual training is needed for the public on the application process
- Timing, Decisions, Deadlines
 - After they are made are, we going to see the dollars spent? When will we see the funding start being spent?

Concerns:

- Particularly interested in who the external partners are
- The construction of these teams is important and of concern
- Have concerns about:
 - o Equity
 - o The expectations for those applying for funds
 - The backlog for core services seems to be getting longer and longer
- About the importance of delivering core services effectively and collectively; to fix/upkeep basic things
- Equity
 - We have one opportunity to get this right!
 - o Do we have specific measures for it? Is there a plan for our agencies, quasi agencies, and non-profits?
 - o Is there a timeline for the Plan?
 - o Equity is a priority for me
 - The importance of equity and equity when making decisions

- Concern eliminating organizations who are doing the work because they don't have a physical location
- Concern:
 - o Equity Development
 - Make sure applications/applicants are received from everywhere throughout city
 - o Feels the application process for scoring is a piecemeal approach
 - o Sustainability of programs moving forward is of concern
 - o The disconnect with some agencies and our communities
 - o There is a desperate need for more cameras for illegal dumping and other violations going on in our city
 - o New Recycling Cans training is needed for communities regarding the process (placing cans on front or back)

Comments:

- Looks forward to working with the Office of Recovery Programs
- Talked about the importance of maximizing funding/dollars
- We should know right now that some of these funds will go to needed core city services and it should not be on just one agency (Administration) to do same
- 6. President Mosby and Chairman Costello both gave brief closing remarks. Chairman Costello said, "I like to continue our dialogue starting with the OPI Office in conjunction with the City Administrator providing a list of the backlog for core agencies services, in volume and priority. And how and/or if some of the ARPA funds can be used to put major dents in those backlogs." Hearing called to recess.
