| 8<br>9<br>10               | Mold is a health risk for many vulnerable members of our community, including infants and children, individuals with respiratory conditions, allergies, or asthma, and persons with weakened immune systems.   |
| 11<br>12<br>13             | Mold grows indoors, typically where there is water damage, high humidity, or dampness. Common sources of indoor moisture that can cause mold to grow include flooding, roof and plumbing leaks, and damp basements and crawl spaces.   |
| 14<br>15<br>16<br>17       | The Institute of Medicine has found sufficient evidence to link indoor exposure to mold to upper respiratory tract symptoms, coughs, and wheezing in otherwise healthy people, and to aggravated asthma symptoms in people with asthma. Indoor exposure to mold can lead to flu-like symptoms, such as cough, congestion, headache, and fatigue.   |
