INTRODUCTION AND READ FIRST TIME

The President laid before the City Council the following bills and Resolutions of the Mayor and City Council for first reading:

Bill No. 15-0561 - By the Council President (The Administration):

A Resolution of the Mayor and City Council approving the designation of the University of Maryland at Baltimore as a "qualified institution" under the State's Regional Institution Strategic Enterprise Zone ("RISE Zone") Program; approving and joining in the application for designation of a RISE Zone at 873 West Baltimore Street, Baltimore, Maryland; and granting a real property tax credit for qualified properties in this RISE Zone.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Baltimore Development Corporation, Taxation, Finance and Economic Development Committee.

Bill No. 15-0562 - By the Council President (The Administration):

An Ordinance authorizing the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore to sell, at either public or private sale, all its interest in certain property known as 10 South Frederick Street (Ward 04, Section 11, Block 1351, Lot 003) and no longer needed for public use; and providing for a special effective date.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the City Solicitor, Planning Commission, Baltimore Development Corporation, Department of Housing and Community Development, Department of Public Works, Department of Real Estate, Department of Finance, Board of Estimates, Taxation, Finance and Economic Development Committee.

Bill No. 15-0563 - By the Council President (The Administration):

An Ordinance authorizing the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore to sell, at either public or private sale, all its interest in a certain parcel of land located in Block 6840 adjacent to Lot 1/22 that is part of the former bed of Cardiff Avenue and no longer needed for public use; and providing for a special effective date.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the City Solicitor, Planning Commission, Department of Housing and Community Development, Department of Public Works, Department of Transportation, Department of Real Estate, Department of Finance, Board of Estimates, Taxation, Finance and Economic Development Committee.

Bill No. 15-0564 - By the Council President (The Administration):

An Ordinance extending the Waterfront Management District to encompass certain adjoining blocks; modifying the criteria for local businesses, organizations, and residents to be represented on the Board of Directors of the Waterfront Management Authority; correcting, clarifying, and conforming related language; making this ordinance subject to certain contingencies; providing for a special effective date; and generally relating to the Waterfront Management District and Authority.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the City Solicitor, Planning Commission, Baltimore Development Corporation, Department of Public Works, Department of Housing and Community Development, Department of Transportation, Board of Estimates, Urban Affairs and Aging Committee.

Bill No. 15-0565 - By the Council President (The Administration):

An Ordinance establishing a tax credit against the personal property tax imposed on qualified supermarkets in Food Desert Incentive Areas; imposing certain limitations, conditions, and qualifications for credit eligibility; providing for the amount, duration, and administration of the

credit; defining certain terms; providing for a special effective date; and generally relating to a personal property tax credit for certain supermarkets.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the City Solicitor, Planning Department, Department of Housing and Community Development, Health Department, Baltimore Development Corporation, Department of Real Estate, Department of Finance, Board of Estimates, Taxation, Finance and Economic Development Committee.

Bill No. 15-0566 - By the Council President (The Administration):

An Ordinance extending the Portable Homestead Tax Credit to include otherwise qualified homeowners who also receive a Targeted Homeowner's Tax Credit; providing for a special effective date; providing for the application of this Ordinance; providing for the automatic termination of the Portable Homestead Tax Credit under certain circumstances; and generally relating to property tax credits.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the City Solicitor, Department of Planning, Baltimore Development Corporation, Department of Real Estate, Department of Housing and Community Development, Department of Finance, Board of Estimates, Taxation, Finance and Economic Development Committee.

Bill No. 15-0567 - By President Young, Councilmembers Curran, Scott, Costello, Middleton, Henry, Holton, Stokes, Kraft, Welch, Clarke, Mosby, Reisinger, Spector:

A Resolution of the Mayor and City Council establishing a continuing, nonlapsing Children and Youth Fund, to be used exclusively to supplement services provided to children and youth; requiring a minimum annual appropriation to this Fund; authorizing the Mayor and City Council, by Ordinance, to provide for the oversight, governance, and administration of this Fund; and submitting this amendment to the qualified voters of the City for adoption or rejection.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the City Solicitor, Department of Finance, Judiciary and Legislative Investigations Committee.

Bill No. 15-0568 - By the Council President, Councilmembers Middleton, Stokes, Holton, Kraft, Spector, Scott, Henry, Mosby, Reisinger, Curran, Welch (Baltimore City Board of Ethics):

An Ordinance conforming exclusions from the definition of "interest" to those recently added to the State Public Ethics Law; clarifying certain other exclusions; modifying, updating, and clarifying provisions that require certain timely notices to newly appointed public servants; modifying, updating, and clarifying provisions that require agencies' assistance in preparing for and administering the annual filing of financial disclosure statements; updating and clarifying provisions that require a record of persons inspecting financial disclosure statements; and generally relating to administration of the City Ethics Code.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the City Solicitor, Department of Human Resources, Department of Finance, Board of Ethics, Judiciary and Legislative Investigations Committee.

Bill No. 15-0569 - By Councilmember Kraft:

An Ordinance naming an unnamed alley, located between the 500 block of South Clinton Street and the 500 block of South Highland Avenue, Harry Way; and providing for a special effective date.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the City Solicitor, Planning Commission, Department of Transportation, Judiciary and Legislative Investigations Committee.

Bill No. 15-0570 - By Councilmembers Kraft, Scott (by request):

An Ordinance amending the Urban Renewal Plan for Highlandtown Business Area to remove a certain land use category from the Plan, to repeal and replace Exhibit 1, "Land Use and Zoning Map", with new exhibits to reflect the change in land use with the removal of a certain land use category and to reflect the change in land use and the change in zoning, upon approval by separate ordinance, for the properties known as 3232, 3234, and 3236-3244 Eastern Avenue, and to add a new height limitation provision for new construction in the community business land use area of the Plan; waiving certain content and procedural requirements; making the provisions of this Ordinance severable; providing for the application of this Ordinance in conjunction with certain other ordinances; and providing for a special effective date.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the City Solicitor, Board of Municipal and Zoning Appeals, Planning Commission, Department of Housing and Community Development, Department of Public Works, Commission for Historical and Architectural Preservation, Baltimore Development Corporation, Department of Transportation, Urban Affairs and Aging Committee.

Bill No. 15-0571 - By Councilmember Kraft (by request):

An Ordinance changing the zoning for the properties known as 3232, 3234, and 3236-3244 Eastern Avenue, as outlined in red on the accompanying plat, from the B-2-2 Zoning District to the B-2-4 Zoning District.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the City Solicitor, Board of Municipal and Zoning Appeals, Planning Commission, Department of Housing and Community Development, Baltimore Development Corporation, Department of Transportation, Land Use and Transportation Committee.

Bill No. 15-0572 - By Councilmember Reisinger (by request):

An Ordinance permitting, subject to certain conditions, the conversion of a single-family dwelling unit to 4 family dwelling units in the R-7 Zoning District on the property known as 1715 Spence Street, as outlined in red on the accompanying plat; and granting variances from certain lot area coverage and floor area ratio requirements.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the City Solicitor, Board of Municipal and Zoning Appeals, Planning Commission, Department of Housing and Community Development, Baltimore Development Corporation, Department of Transportation, Land Use and Transportation Committee.

Bill No. 15-0573 - By Councilmember Kraft (by request):

An Ordinance changing the zoning for the property known as 502 Albemarle Street, as outlined in red on the accompanying plat, from the B-3-2 Zoning District and the M-2-2 Zoning District to the B-2-4 Zoning District, and by changing the zoning for a portion of the property known as Duker Alley, as outlined in red on the accompanying plat, from the M-2-2 Zoning District to the B-2-4 Zoning District.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the City Solicitor, Board of Municipal and Zoning Appeals, Planning Commission, Department of Housing and Community Development, Baltimore Development Corporation, Department of Transportation, Land Use and Transportation Committee.

Bill No. 15-0574 - By Councilmember Costello (by request):

An Ordinance changing the zoning for the property known as 1430-1444 Lawrence Street, as outlined in red on the accompanying plat, from the R-8 Zoning District to the B-2-4 Zoning District.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the City Solicitor, Board of Municipal and Zoning Appeals, Planning Commission, Department of Housing and Community Development, Baltimore Development Corporation, Department of Transportation, Land Use and Transportation Committee.

Bill No. 15-0575 - By Councilmember Costello (by request):

An Ordinance changing the zoning for the properties known as 1520-1530 Beason Street, 1600 Beason Street, and 1220 Towson Street, as outlined in red on the accompanying plat, from the M-2-2 Zoning District to the B-1-3 Zoning District.

An Ordinance requiring a public hearing by the Planning Commission, with posted notice, for all site-specific matters over which the Planning Commission has the final administrative authority; specifying the size, contents, construction, and number of the signs to be posted and the manner and timing of their posting; qualifying the Planning Commission's authority to determine what constitutes a "minor modification" to a Planned Unit Development; modifying certain provisions requiring advance delivery to Councilmembers of Commission meeting agendas; and correcting, clarifying, and conforming related language.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the City Solicitor, Board of Municipal and Zoning Appeals, Planning Commission, Department of Housing and Community Development, Land Use and Transportation Committee.

Bill No. 15-0577 - By Councilmembers Stokes, Middleton, Welch, Scott, Reisinger, Clarke, Branch, Curran, Costello:

An Ordinance reducing the Stormwater Remediation Fees imposed by City law; and providing for a special effective date.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the City Solicitor, Department of Public Works, Department of Finance, Board of Estimates, Judiciary and Legislative Investigations Committee.

A COUNCIL RESOLUTION CONCERNING

Request for Federal Action – Prevent Chemical Disasters

FOR the purpose of calling on the Environmental Protection Agency to move quickly to finalize a strong rule requiring chemical plants and refineries to use the safest cost-effective chemicals and technology available in order to protect the millions of Americans, including many Baltimoreans, living in the shadows of potentially dangerous chemical facilities.

Recitals

It is vital to the safety and security of millions of Americans that the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) move quickly to finalize a strong rule requiring chemical plants and refineries to use the safest cost-effective chemicals and technology available. The EPA has an historic opportunity to protect the 100 million people across the U.S. who live, work, study, and play in the shadow of dangerous chemical facilities.

We in Baltimore City, along with many other localities across the county are working to protect the people who live, work, and go to school in our neighborhoods, but we need more help. There have been over 350 chemical disasters across the nation in just the past two years, causing 79 deaths and sending nearly 1,500 victims to the hospital. Closer to home there have been at least 10 chemical incidents and disasters in Maryland over the past five years, and at least 4 chemical incidents and disasters in Baltimore over that same time span. Baltimore also hosts at least 32 potentially vulnerable chemical facilities.

To prevent more unnecessary incidents and make these chemical plants less attractive terrorist targets, we need a strong EPA rule requiring facilities to use the safest cost-effective chemicals and technology. A strong rule should also incorporate assistance and funding to cities across the country to make similar safety improvements, and co-enforce the federal standards.

We respectfully urge the EPA to use its authority to expedite the chemical security rule, so it will be finalized in time to avoid challenges. As representatives of the citizens of Baltimore, we ask the EPA to think of the citizens who live with this deadly risk every day, and work quickly to finalize a strong rule.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF BALTIMORE, that the Council calls on the Environmental Protection Agency to move quickly to finalize a strong rule requiring chemical plants and refineries to use the safest cost-effective chemicals and technology available in order to protect the millions of Americans, including many Baltimoreans, living in the shadows of potentially dangerous chemical facilities.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of this Resolution be sent to the Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency, the Mayor, the Honorable Members of the Maryland House and Senate Delegations to the 114th Congress, and the Mayor's Legislative Liaison to the City Council.

A COUNCIL RESOLUTION CONCERNING

**Request for Federal Action - Increasing the Low Income Home
Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) Funding**

FOR the purpose of urging the President of the United States and the members of the U.S. House and Senate Appropriations Committees to increase the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) funding to no less than \$4.7 billion to ensure greater protections for minority, low- and fixed-income households that are struggling to pay their energy bills.

WHEREAS, The Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) was authorized by Title XXVI of the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1981 (Public Law 97-35, 95 Stat.357) and began in 1982; and

WHEREAS, The purpose of LIHEAP is to assist low-income households, particularly those under the poverty level, that pay a high proportion of household income for home energy to meet immediate home energy needs; and

WHEREAS, Federal dollars for LIHEAP are allocated by the United States Department of Health and Human Services to the states as a block grant and are disbursed under programs designed by the individual states; and

WHEREAS, LIHEAP is not an entitlement and accordingly remains dependent on the Federal appropriations process for its funding; and

WHEREAS, LIHEAP is administered at the state and county levels by government agencies and implemented primarily at the local level by Community Action Programs (CAPs), local welfare agencies, and area agencies on aging; and

WHEREAS, Even though the number of households eligible for the LIHEAP program continues to exceed those receiving assistance, this funding has been a lifeline during the economic downturn, helping to ensure that people do not have to choose between paying their energy bills and paying for food or medicine; and

WHEREAS, The number of households eligible for LIHEAP has increased, but only one in five eligible households nationwide actually get the benefits; and

WHEREAS, Federal law requires that families receiving LIHEAP assistance have incomes below 150% of the Federal poverty level or 60% of the state median income; and

WHEREAS, The increasing poverty rate coupled with underfunding of energy assistance programs could potentially increase arrearages, thus creating a more tenuous situation for families that are unable to pay their bills; and

WHEREAS, The LIHEAP program budget has been cut by \$1.7 billion – a decrease of more than one-third between 2009 to 2014; and

WHEREAS, The \$3.4 billion allocated for Fiscal Year 2015 is far less than the \$4.7 billion requested from Members of Congress, Mayors from 20 states, utility companies, and advocates for the poor.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF BALTIMORE, That this Body urges the President of the United States and the members of the U.S. House and Senate Appropriations Committees to increase LIHEAP funding to no less than \$4.7 billion to ensure greater protections for minority, low- and fixed-income households that are struggling to pay their energy bills.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of this Resolution be sent to the President of the United States, the Vice President of the United States, Members of Congress, the House and Senate Leadership, the Baltimore City Delegation to the Maryland General Assembly, the

Baltimore City Department of Housing, the Housing Authority of Baltimore City, and the Mayor's Office of Intergovernmental Affairs.

A Resolution supporting efforts to improve access to broadband internet service in Baltimore and calling for the development of City polices to advance these efforts as well as a comprehensive broadband development and implementation plan for Baltimore City.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Mayor's Office of Information Technology, Department of Transportation, Planning Department, Baltimore City Public School System, Department of Finance, Department of Public Works, Judiciary and Legislative Investigations Committee.

Bill No. 15-0264R - By Councilmembers Mosby, Clarke, President Young, Councilmembers Scott, Costello, Middleton, Stokes, Kraft, Holton, Welch, Henry, Spector, Reisinger, Curran, Branch:

A Resolution calling upon the City Administration and Baltimore Police Department to immediately restore 911 operators and dispatchers as public safety employees with the Baltimore Police Department; to cross-train operators and dispatchers so that both groups can handle either position; and to provide adequate staffing and sufficient management to avoid busy signals, delayed dispatch of crimes in progress, and other current miscommunications, which have negatively affected citizen confidence in a 911 system on which our calls for help and very lives depend.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Police Department, Public Safety Committee.

Bill No. 15-0265R - By Councilmembers Henry, Clarke, Scott, Spector, Costello, President Young, Councilmembers Middleton, Stokes, Holton, Welch, Reisinger, Branch, Curran, Kraft, Mosby:

A Resolution urging Baltimore City Public Schools to reconsider its inequitable proposed public charter school funding formula to ensure that adequate funds are allocated to all Baltimore students in accordance with State law.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Baltimore City Public School System, Education and Youth Committee.

A COUNCIL RESOLUTION CONCERNING**“Step it Up” to Promote Walking and Walkable Communities**

FOR the purpose of supporting the U.S. Surgeon General’s call to “Step it Up” and promote walking and walkable communities, and asking representatives from the City agencies most capable of promoting walking and walkability in Baltimore to report on the tangible steps that the City is taking to do so.

Recitals

Regular physical activity has been consistently shown to alleviate many chronic conditions, lengthen lives, and improve mental health. Yet, despite these many benefits, the Surgeon General has found that “only one-half of all U.S. adults and about one-quarter of high school students meet the guideline for aerobic physical activity”.

In an effort to increase the number of Americans benefitting from regular physical activity, Surgeon General Vivek H. Murthy recently issued a call to action to “Step it Up” and promote walking and walkable communities. In this call to action, he states “walking is an excellent way for most people to increase their physical activity. It is a powerful public health strategy for the following reasons:

- Walking is an easy way to start and maintain a physically active lifestyle.
- Walking is the most common form of physical activity for people across the country.
- Walking can serve many purposes. It can be a way to exercise, have fun, or get to school, work, or other nearby destinations.
- Making walking easier can help communities by improving safety, social cohesion, and local economies and reducing air pollution.”

In order to get more Americans walking, the Surgeon General calls for both increased outreach and education to encourage individuals to make walking a regular part of their lives and for all levels of government to take tangible steps to increase the walkability of our communities.

According to the National League of Cities, “studies show that when cities implement design solutions to promote walkable communities and active transportation, such as sidewalks, curb cuts and more green spaces, they have greater potential to reap significant public health, economic, environmental and social benefits. These benefits can include improved health of residents and an increase in property values, tourism, and economic investment. Walking also provides opportunities for people to build stronger relationships with neighbors and supports stronger overall community bonds among residents.”

It is important that Baltimore join in this national effort to improve our citizens' health and well-being by encouraging and enabling more people to walk on a regular basis. Not only can the impact on individuals' lives be profound, these efforts can also breathe new life into neighborhoods by making them more attractive and welcoming for both current residents and potential newcomers.

Again, according to the National League of Cities, "the Urban Land Institute found that 50 percent of people consider walkability a high or top priority when choosing a place to live. In a survey done by the National Association of Realtors and the Transportation Research Center at Portland State University, 79 percent of respondents indicated that being within walking distance of amenities, such as parks and shops, was an important factor in the decision of where to buy a home, and 85 percent indicated sidewalks were also important. Furthermore, this survey found that although all generations like to walk, Millennials (people ages 18-34) prefer walking over driving by 12 percent, the largest margin than any other generation."

Baltimore has taken steps to improve our City's walkability in line with the Surgeon General's call to action, but much more can and should be done. Encouraging walking and the development of walkable communities can greatly improve the health of both Baltimoreans and Baltimore as a whole. It is an effort that we must all join Surgeon General Murthy in pursuing.

Informational Hearing – Baltimore City’s Efforts to Make Homelessness a Rare and Brief Experience

FOR the purpose of calling on representatives from the City agencies engaged in the struggle against homelessness to appear before the City Council to update it on the City’s efforts to make homelessness a rare and brief experience in Baltimore, and to discuss where improvements can be made in best utilizing the City’s partnerships and resources to meet this goal.

Recitals

Homelessness and the complicated conditions that create and maintain it – poverty, a dearth of housing available to low income households, and a lack of health and supportive services – remain serious problems throughout our nation and here in Baltimore. The work to make homelessness a rare and brief experience requires constant effort and adaptation to changing conditions.

Baltimore’s efforts to aid our homeless population, estimated at more than 2600 on any given night, are multifaceted and spread among a number of City agencies and programs. The City must also work in partnership with many other government agencies on the local, State, and Federal levels, as well as with private service providers, in order to effectively address the many issues that must be considered by any attempt to combat homelessness.

Since homelessness is a persistent problem that is too often ignored, it is important that the Council make every effort to keep it at the forefront of decision makers’ minds. With too few resources allocated to this complicated issue, it is vitally important to ensure that all of those resources are being employed in the most effective way possible.

Homelessness is a problem that requires constant engagement, cooperative efforts amongst many stakeholders, and a focused approach to making use of scant resources where they can do the most good. Periodic discussions about how well the City’s approach meets these principles and where improvements can be made are essential if Baltimore is ever to achieve its goal of making homelessness a rare and brief experience.

Historically, the area was comprised of industrial uses that either served the water or downtown, but many of the warehouse buildings have become vacant and the reuse of the buildings for an industrial use has become obsolete.
