INTRODUCTION AND READ FIRST TIME

The President laid before the City Council the following bills and Resolutions of the Mayor and City Council for first reading:

Bill No. 19-0330 - By the Council President (The Administration):

An Ordinance amending the tax rates used to calculate the Yield Excise Tax imposed on the tax yield from transactions for which recordation taxes and transfer taxes are due under City Code Article 28, Subtitle 16 and Subtitle 17, respectively; and providing for a special effective date.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the City Solicitor, Department of Planning, Department of Housing and Community Development, Baltimore Development Corporation, Department of Finance, Board of Estimates, Taxation, Finance and Economic Development Committee.

Bill No. 19-0331 - By the Council President (The Administration):

An Ordinance correcting the name of the Consumer Price Index used in the annual adjustment of the energy tax rate; modifying the fiscal year for the rate adjustment; and providing for a special effective date.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the City Solicitor, Baltimore Development Corporation, Health Department, Department of Finance, Department of Public Works, Department of Housing and Community Development, Taxation, Finance and Economic Development Committee.

Bill No. 19-0332 - By the Council President (The Administration):

An Ordinance adopting a new Sustainability Plan for Baltimore City; providing for a special effective date; and generally relating to all elements of sustainability, including air quality, water quality, resource conservation and recycling, energy, public health, environmental justice, reduction of greenhouse gas emissions, and increasing the use of alternative means of transportation.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the City Solicitor, Office of Sustainability, Department of Planning, Department of Finance, Health Department, Department of Public Works, Department of General Services, Judiciary and Legislative Investigations Committee.

Bill No. 19-0333 - By Councilmembers Sneed, Stokes, President Young (by request):

An Ordinance changing the zoning for the properties known as 801-803 North Chester Street (Block 1605, Lots 001 and 002), as outlined in red on the accompanying plat, from the R-8 Zoning District to the C-1 Zoning District.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the City Solicitor, Board of Municipal and Zoning Appeals, Planning Commission, Department of Housing and Community Development, Baltimore Development Corporation, Department of Transportation, Land Use and Transportation Committee.

Bill No. 19-0334 - By Councilmembers Sneed, Henry, Bullock, Burnett, Cohen, Dorsey, Scott, Clarke, Middleton, Reisinger:

An Ordinance redefining “employer” for purposes of the laws governing unlawful employment practices.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the City Solicitor, Office of Civil Rights, Department of Finance, Labor Committee.

Bill No. 19-0335 - By Councilmember Henry:

An Ordinance providing that, in an I-MU Zoning District (or, as it may be renamed, an “IMU-1” Zoning District), banquet halls are allowed as a conditional use requiring approval by Ordinance of the Mayor and City Council.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the City Solicitor, Board of Municipal and Zoning Appeals, Planning Commission, Department of Transportation, Department of Housing and Community Development, Baltimore Development Corporation, Land Use and Transportation Committee.

Bill No. 19-0336 - By the Council President (Baltimore City Board of Ethics):

An Ordinance conforming the City Ethics Code with the amendments to the State Ethics Law made by Chapter 31, 2017 Laws of Maryland; altering the definition of “interest” to exclude certain mutual funds and exchange-traded funds; adding a participation prohibition for certain officials who are former lobbyists; prohibiting elected officials from assisting in certain matters under certain circumstances; altering a reporting requirement for certain debts; adding a requirement to report when a public official’s spouse is a lobbyist; limiting access to home addresses listed in a financial disclosure statement; clarifying and conforming related provisions; and generally relating to the City Ethics Code.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the City Solicitor, Board of Ethics, Judiciary and Legislative Investigations Committee.

The President laid before the City Council the following Council Resolutions for first reading:

A Resolution requesting an informational hearing with all the governmental agencies responding to the opioid epidemic in Baltimore City, including the Health Department, the Mayor's Office, the Fire Department, and the Baltimore Police Department, so that these agencies can update the Baltimore City Council regarding their response to the epidemic.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Health Department, Mayor's Office of Human Services, Fire Department, Police Department, Budget and Appropriations Committee.

A COUNCIL RESOLUTION CONCERNING

Recognizing Black Lives Matter Week of Action in Baltimore City Schools

FOR the purpose of recognizing the first full week of February each year as "Black Lives Matter At School Week of Action" and calling on all schools and organizations dealing with youth in Baltimore to do their part to bring awareness to the school-to-prison pipeline, the need to

recruit and retain Black teachers, and the full rights of students as outlined in the National Student Bill of Rights.

Recitals

Black Lives Matter At School is a national committee of educators organizing for racial justice in education. They encourage all educators, students, parents, unions, and community organizations to join their annual week of action during the first week of February each year.

Schools and local officials must actively combat racism and confront the existence of a school-to-prison pipeline in this era of mass incarceration. The educational system, as it stands, utilizes harsh disciplinary policies, provides limited opportunities for students to learn about their own cultures, and excludes the history of struggle and contribution of Black people and other people of color. Furthermore, the racial composition of our teachers does not reflect the racial composition of our student body. In fact, there is a wide gap between the percentage of Black teachers and Black students in Baltimore City.

For those reasons, Black Lives Matter At School calls for:

- 1) an end to "zero tolerance" discipline and the implementation of restorative justice policies in our schools;
- 2) the hiring of more Black teachers;
- 3) the inclusion of Black history and ethnic studies in the K-12 curriculum; and
- 4) the funding of additional counselors in our schools.

The first Black Lives Matter At School national week of action was organized in 2018, and thousands of educators around the United States wore Black Lives Matter shirts to school and taught lessons about structural racism, intersectional Black identities, Black history, and anti-racist movements. Educators in over 20 cities, including Baltimore, Seattle, Philadelphia, Los Angeles, Chicago, Detroit, Boston, New York City, and Washington, D.C., participated in this national uprising to affirm the lives of Black students, teachers, and families.

The lessons that educators taught during the week of action corresponded to the thirteen guiding principles of Black Lives Matter:

Monday: Restorative Justice, Empathy, and Loving Engagement

Tuesday: Diversity and Globalism

Wednesday: Trans-Affirming, Queer Affirming, and Collective Value

Thursday: Intergenerational, Black Families, and Black Villages

Friday: Black Women and Unapologetically Black

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF BALTIMORE, That the Council recognizes the first full week in February as “Black Lives Matter At School Week of Action” and calls on all schools and organizations dealing with youth in Baltimore to do their part to bring awareness to the school-to-prison pipeline, the need to recruit and retain Black teachers, and the full rights of students as outlined in the National Student Bill of Rights.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of this Resolution be sent to the Mayor, the CEO of Baltimore City Public Schools, the Director of the Office of Civil Rights and Wage Enforcement, the CEO of the Enoch Pratt Free Library, the Chair of the Youth Commission, the Director of the Department of Recreation and Parks, and the Mayor's Legislative Liaison to the City Council.

A COUNCIL RESOLUTION CONCERNING

Supporting Coal Community Transition Legislation in Maryland

FOR the purpose of urging the Maryland General Assembly to pass and the Governor to sign legislation establishing a clear and enforceable commitment to finally move Maryland beyond coal-fired power plants, and to create a Coal Community Transition Fund to support impacted communities and workers.

Recitals

In 2016, Maryland enacted a law requiring the state to reduce climate pollution 40% below 2006 levels by 2030. Despite these long-term efforts, the City is presently in non-attainment for the National Ambient Air Quality Standard for ground-level ozone pollution.

Currently, there are 6 remaining coal-fired power plants in Maryland, including two coal plants operating in close proximity to Baltimore, the Herbert Wagner Plant and the Brandon Shores Plant, located in Anne Arundel County. Together, all 6 plants emitted 9 million metric tons of climate disrupting carbon pollution, equivalent to over 40% of passenger vehicles on the road in Maryland.

Four of the state's remaining coal plants, including the Brandon Shores plant, routinely discharge arsenic, selenium, and mercury in concentrations that exceed the Environmental Protection Agency's Effluent Limitation Guidelines. In fact, a 2011 Natural Resources Defense Council report found that the Brandon Shores plant released the second highest amount of toxic air pollutants annually of any plant in the nation, approximately 13.1 million pounds. Furthermore, this plant discharges toxic metals directly into the Patapsco river.

Three of the state's remaining coal plants, including the Herbert Wagner plant, are operating without state-of-the-art pollution controls for smog-forming nitrogen oxides. Moreover, the Herbert Wagner plant is operating without state-of-the-art pollution controls for harmful sulfur dioxide and is one of the highest emitting power plants for sulfur dioxide (in lb/MMBtu) in the region.

It is well-documented that elevated sulfur dioxide and nitrogen oxide levels are leading causes of respiratory ailments such as asthma. Indeed, the asthma hospitalization rate in Baltimore is double the rate in Maryland and nearly triple the national average. Measures of

poverty, especially median household income, are strongly correlated with asthma hospitalization and emergency room visit rates in Baltimore.

The Maryland General Assembly should consider Coal Community Transition legislation that would establish greenhouse gas emissions standards for coal plants. In effect, the legislation should set pollution standards that force the closure of Maryland's 6 remaining coal-fired power plants by 2025. Noting this impact, the legislation should create a transition fund for Maryland communities affected by the phase-out of coal-fired plants. This fund should set aside monies annually to protect and support communities and workers traditionally reliant on these fossil fuel facilities. Specifically, the fund should provide job retraining assistance necessary to allow displaced workers to re-enter the workforce in a timely manner, support the growth of clean energy projects in impacted communities and the redevelopment of the former power plant sites, add new family-sustaining, and wherever possible, union jobs to the local clean energy economy, and be governed by communities and appropriate constituencies to ensure local control of community benefits.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF BALTIMORE, That the Baltimore City Council urges the Maryland General Assembly to pass and the Governor to sign legislation establishing a clear and enforceable commitment to finally move Maryland beyond coal-fired power plants and to create a Coal Community Transition Fund to support impacted communities and workers.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of this Resolution be sent to the Governor, the Honorable Chairs and Members of the Baltimore City House and Senate Delegations to the Maryland General Assembly, the President of the Maryland Senate, the Maryland House Speaker, the Honorable Chair of the House Economic Matters Committee, the Honorable Chair of the House Environment and Transportation Committee, the Honorable Chair of the Senate Education, Health & Environmental Affairs Committee, the Mayor, and the Mayor's Legislative Liaison to the City Council.
