Dear Honorable President and Members of the City Council:

I am pleased to inform your Honorable Body that I have signed into law this day the following bills:

BILL 21-0053 – An ordinance concerning - Rezoning - 4207-4209 Menlo Drive - For the purpose of changing the zoning for the property known as 4207-4209 Menlo Drive, as outlined in red on the accompanying plat, from the I-1 Zoning District to the OIC Zoning District; and providing for a special effective date.

BILL 21-0057 – An ordinance concerning - Repeal - Reisterstown Plaza Transit Station Urban Renewal Area and Plan - For the purpose of repealing Ordinance 09-219, which established the Reisterstown Plaza Transit Station Urban Renewal Area and Plan; and providing for a special effective date.

BILL 21-0066 – An ordinance concerning - Retirement Systems - Precluded Investment and Divestment - Fossil Fuel Companies - For the purpose of prohibiting the new investment of certain retirement funds in fossil fuel companies; requiring the divestment of certain retirement funds in fossil fuel companies within a certain timeframe; requiring certain reviews; specifying a certain procedure for the divestiture of investments; authorizing certain exemptions; defining certain terms; and providing for a special effective date.

BILL 21-0097 – An ordinance concerning - Emergency Security Deposit Relief Act - For the purpose of establishing the Emergency Security Deposit Voucher Program; placing a cap on the amount of money the Emergency Security Deposit Voucher Program can give each family for a security deposit; providing for certain funding for the Emergency Security Deposit Voucher Program; setting forth the eligibility requirements for the Emergency Security Deposit Voucher Program; requiring that the Department of Housing and Community Development adopt rules and regulations to administer the Emergency Security Deposit Voucher Program; establishing procedures on a family's admission into the Emergency Security Deposit Voucher Program; putting certain priorities in place for distribution of security deposit vouchers; requiring the security deposit voucher to be used within a certain time frame; making a family liable for the cost of the security deposit voucher upon a Departmental finding that the family has used the security deposit voucher improperly; providing for an appeals process in case of a finding of improper use of the security deposit voucher or denial of a security deposit voucher; defining certain terms; and providing for termination of this subtitle on a certain date.

INTRODUCTION AND READ FIRST TIME

Bill No. 21-0159 - By Councilmember Conway, Dorsey, Bullock, Cohen, Burnett, Bullock, Torrence, Middleton, Ramos, Porter, Glover

An ordinance converting the City fleet of vehicles, subject to certain exceptions, to zero-emission vehicles; defining certain terms; authorizing rules and regulations; and generally related to the City's procurement of vehicles

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Ways and Means Committee.

Bill No. 21-0160 - By Councilmember Conway, Dorsey, Porter, Bullock, Middleton, Burnett, Cohen, Stokes, Ramos, Glover

An ordinance requiring newly constructed buildings and additions to existing buildings partly financed using City funds to adhere to specified roofing requirements; authorizing certain exceptions; and generally relating to the installation of Cool Roofs.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Rules and Legislative Oversight Committee.

Bill No. 21-0161 - An ordinance making City operations achieve net-zero emissions of greenhouse gases by 2050; defining certain terms; authorizing rules and regulations; and generally related to the City's emission of greenhouse gasses.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Health, Environment and Technology Committee.

Bill No. 21-0162 - By Councilmember Porter

An ordinance amending the Urban Renewal Plan for Brooklyn-Curtis Bay to extend the time the Urban Renewal Plan for Brooklyn-Curtis Bay remains in full force and effect; amending the Urban Renewal Plan for Brooklyn-Curtis Bay to reauthorize the acquisition of properties within the Project Area and to extend the life of the Plan; waiving certain content and procedural requirements; making the provisions of this Ordinance severable; providing for the application of this Ordinance in conjunction with certain other ordinances; and providing for a special effective date.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Public Safety and Government Operations Committee.

Bill No. 21-0164 - By Councilmember Burnett, Dorsey, Porter, Bullock, Cohen, Middleton, Torrence

An ordinance requiring the Baltimore City Fire Chief to prepare a Decennial Fire and Emergency Medical Services Redistricting Plan; requiring the Fire Chief to present the Plan to the Mayor and City Council; requiring the Plan to be approved by resolution of the Mayor and City Council; allowing the Mayor and City Council to amend the Plan under certain circumstances; and generally relating to redistricting the Baltimore City fire battalions and emergency medical services districts.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Public Safety and Government Operations Committee.

A resolution inviting the Director of the Department of Housing and Community Development, the City Administrator, the City Solicitor, the Maryland Insurance Commissioner, the Baltimore City Comptroller, and the President and CEO of the Baltimore Development Corporation to testify regarding requiring owners of vacant residential properties to obtain homeowners insurance.

The resolution was read the first time and referred to the Department of Housing and Community Development, the City Administrator, the City Solicitor, the Maryland Insurance Administration, the Baltimore City Comptroller, the Baltimore Development Corporation, and the Economic and Community Development Committee.

A resolution inviting representatives from the Mayor's Office, the Health Department, the Baltimore Police Department, Baltimore City Public Schools, the Mayor's Office of Homeless Services, the Mayor's Office of Employment Development, the Baltimore City Office of Equity and Civil Rights, the Baltimore City State's Attorney's Office, the Baltimore City Department of Social Services, the Maryland Department of Health, Behavioral Health System Baltimore, and other relevant stakeholders to update the Council on services provided to and the general well-being of the transgender community in Baltimore City.

Recitals

WHEREAS, A national study showed that 49% of students have been bullied in one way or another (physical, verbal, or cyber) while in grades 4 through 12;

WHEREAS, Students who are bullied are more likely to experience depression, anxiety, sleep difficulties, academic problems, and drop out of school than students who are not bullied;

WHEREAS, Bullying is a public health crisis effecting not only our children but people of all ages;

WHEREAS, Every October, schools and organizations across the country observe National Bullying Prevention Month;

WHEREAS, The goal of National Bullying Prevention Month is to encourage communities to work together to stop bullying and cyberbullying by increasing awareness of its prevalence and impact;

WHEREAS, We call on all schools and organizations dealing with youth in Baltimore to do their part in bringing awareness to this crisis;

WHEREAS, Bullying causes such distress that often children will harm themselves or even commit suicide; and

WHEREAS, With enough education and attention to this crisis we can end bullying.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF BALTIMORE, That the City Council recognizes October as National Bullying Prevention Month and calls on all schools and organizations dealing with youth in Baltimore to do their part to bring awareness to the bullying crisis and work to end bullying.

A COUNCIL RESOLUTION CONCERNING**House America Pledge**

FOR the purpose of announcing that Baltimore City proudly joins *House America* and pledges to respond with urgency to homelessness and housing insecurity in our community by setting and achieving ambitious re-housing goals, creating pathways to homeownership, and addressing the impact of the racial wealth gap on housing inequity.

Recitals

WHEREAS, The City Council of Baltimore is committed to ensuring that all residents have a safe and affordable place to live;

WHEREAS, In Baltimore City – the birthplace of redlining and the country's first racial zoning law – homelessness, housing insecurity, and historic discrimination continues to impact all of our residents, and a lack of housing remains a barrier to the health, safety, well-being, employment, and education for these individuals and families;

WHEREAS, In 2020, the Point-in-Time count found that 2,193 people are experiencing homelessness in Baltimore on any given night, hundreds of families await rental assistance or housing vouchers, and tens of thousands of residents are burdened by lack of affordable housing options;

WHEREAS, More than 580,000 people on a given night were experiencing homelessness in America when the COVID-19 pandemic began and had to endure the COVID-19 pandemic without the safety and protection of a stable home, while the homelessness crisis has been further exacerbated during and due to the COVID-19 pandemic;

WHEREAS, The most effective approach to solving homelessness and housing insecurity requires identifying and assisting residents who are experiencing homelessness, at risk of losing their housing, or lack access to affordable housing and homeownership;

WHEREAS, The Baltimore City Council is dedicated to ensuring there are few barriers to obtaining permanent housing quickly through housing counseling and navigation assistance, tailored levels of rental assistance, and wrap-around supportive services;

WHEREAS, The Baltimore City Council will make policy decisions that address longstanding inequities and is committed to being accountable to our residents and our communities;

WHEREAS, The American Rescue Plan provides communities with significant new resources to address homelessness, including 70,000 emergency housing vouchers, \$5 billion in grants through the US Department of Housing and Urban Development's HOME Investment Partnerships program, and \$350 billion in State and Local Recovery Funds through the Department of the Treasury;

WHEREAS, The City of Baltimore has received 278 emergency housing vouchers and \$641 million in State and Local Recovery Funds, which provides the City with an opportunity to make

strategic, long-term, and significant investments in our residents and the various communities that serve them;

WHEREAS, These vouchers and funds will help Baltimore better serve all of our residents, from those who are chronically homeless, to those who are living on the edge and working to escape poverty, and to help build generational wealth;

WHEREAS, *House America*, launched on September 20, 2021, is a partnership between the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (“HUD”), the United States Interagency Council on Homelessness (“USICH”), states, and communities to respond with urgency to address the crisis of homelessness and create affordable housing;

WHEREAS, Through *House America*, HUD Secretary Marcia L. Fudge calls on state and local leaders to set and achieve ambitious goals for re-housing households currently experiencing homelessness and developing new supportive and affordable housing units; and

WHEREAS, The Baltimore City Council is committed to working with HUD and USICH to use American Rescue Plan resources and other federal, state, and local resources to make progress towards creating more housing security in Baltimore by joining with our local, state and federal partners to end homelessness and create pathways for more City residents to secure quality rentals and buy their own homes.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF BALTIMORE, That the Baltimore City Council announces that Baltimore City proudly joins *House America* and pledges to respond with urgency to homelessness and housing insecurity in our community by setting and achieving ambitious re-housing goals, creating pathways to homeownership, and addressing the impact of the racial wealth gap on housing inequity.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of this Resolution be sent to the Mayor, the Acting Commissioner for the Department of Housing and Community Development, and the Mayor’s Legislative Liaison to the City Council.

BILL NO. 21-0079 REPORTED FAVORABLY AND ORDERED PRINTED FOR THIRD READING

Councilmember Middleton, for the Economic and Community Development Committee, reported that the Committee has complied with the Land Use Article of the Maryland Code and recommends the adoption of Bill No. 21-0079 favorably.

An Ordinance repealing Ordinance 90-425, as amended by Ordinance 00-57, Ordinance 02-431, Ordinance 04-884, and Ordinance 16-572, which designated certain properties as an Industrial Planned Unit Development known as Port Covington; and providing for a special effective date.

Findings of Fact

City Council Bill No. 21-0079

Repeal of Ordinance 90-425 - Port Covington Planned Unit Development

IN GENERAL:

*To approve the repeal of this PUD, the City Council has considered and finds that:

☒ the repeal of the planned unit development is in the public interest for the following reasons:

The Port Covington Master Plan was adopted by the Baltimore City Planning Commission on June 23, 2016 after a six-month public master planning process conducted with the Urban Design and Architectural Review Panel. Implementation of the Master Plan will redevelop approximately 260 acres of underutilized industrial land into a new City neighborhood. The Master Plan provides for approximately 46 blocks of mixed-use development and more than 40 acres of open space and is envisioned to span over the course of the next 20 years.

In order to facilitate the redevelopment of Port Covington from mostly larger industrial parcels to a full street grid that is envisioned to have varying scale mixed-use buildings, there are many steps that are required. The plan outlines the major areas for implementation, one of which is Land Use and Zoning. As noted in the Master Plan and the staff report for the Port Covington Master Plan adoption, there are many land use approvals needed that will incrementally happen over the course of many years, there are several items that are outlined to happen in the first couple of years to set the stage for development. These items include:

- Repeal of the Urban Renewal Plan
- Amend or Repeal the Planned Unit Development
- Modify the impending new City of Baltimore Zoning Code
- Create new streets and subdivide parcels for new development

In 2016, the Urban Renewal Plan was amended and there was a major amendment to the Planned Unit Development. At that time, the new zoning code was not yet adopted and amendments were needed to the PUD in order to help facilitate the proposed redevelopment. In December 2016, the new zoning code was adopted that included four Port Covington zoning categories.
