APPOINTMENTS BY THE MAYOR

AMY M. MCCLAIN, as a member of the Affordable Housing Trust Fund Commission, for a term expiring December 3, 2024, as a member from District 11.

INTRODUCTION AND READ FIRST TIME

The President laid before the City Council the following bills and Resolutions of the Mayor and City Council for first reading:

Bill No. 22-0235 - By City Council President (Administration - Department of Finance)

An Ordinance providing the appropriations estimated to be needed by each agency of the City of Baltimore for operating programs and capital projects during the Fiscal 2023 year.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Ways and Means Committee.

Bill No. 22-0236 - By City Council President (Administration - Department of Finance)

An Ordinance providing a tax for the use of the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore for the period July 1, 2022, through June 30, 2023; and setting the semiannual payment service charge for that period.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Ways and Means Committee.

Bill No. 22-0237 - By City Council President (Administration - Baltimore City Board of School Commissioners)

An Ordinance approving the budget estimated to be needed for the Baltimore City Board of School Commissioners for operating programs during Fiscal 2023; providing for certification of the approved budget to the State Superintendent of Schools; and providing for a special effective date.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Ways and Means Committee.

Bill No. 22-0238 - By Councilmember Ramos, Porter, Cohen, Conway

An Ordinance altering the method by which individuals are selected to be members of the advisory board that appoints the Inspector General; requiring a member of the City Council to consider certain factors when nominating a candidate for the advisory board; setting term limits and staggering certain terms; and submitting this amendment to the qualified voters of the City for adoption or rejection.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Rules and Oversight Committee.

Bill No. 22-0239 - By City Council President (Administration - Department of Real Estate)

An Ordinance authorizing the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore to sell, at either public or private sale, all its interest in certain property that is located at 2001 Park Avenue (Block 3448; Lot 030) and is no longer needed for public use; and providing for a special effective date.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Ways and Means Committee.

Bill No. 22-0240 - By City Council President (Administration - Department of Real Estate)

An Ordinance authorizing the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore to sell, at either public or private sale, all its interest in certain property located at 711 North Arlington Avenue (Block 0104, Portion of Lot 062) and no longer needed for public use; and providing for a special effective date.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Ways and Means Committee.

Bill No. 22-0241 - By President Mosby and Councilmember Porter

An Ordinance requiring a youth sports program to have emergency medical services personnel present at all youth football games in which youth athletes participate.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Education, Workforce, and Youth Committee.

The President laid before the City Council the following Council Resolutions for first reading:

Bill No. 22-0105R - By Councilmember Stokes

A Resolution providing the required approval under Md. Code Ann., Alc. Bev. § 12-902.1(d)(1) to allow the license holder holding a valid Class B-D-7 Beer, Wine, and Liquor License issued for use at 1238 Greenmount Avenue, Baltimore, Maryland 21202 to apply to the Board of Liquor License Commissioners for Baltimore City to exchange their Class B-D-7 Beer, Wine, and Liquor License for a Class A-7 Beer, Wine, and Liquor License.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Economic and Community Development Committee.

Bill No. 22-0106R - By Councilmember Burnett, Conway, Porter, Ramos, Bullock, Dorsey, Cohen, Glover, Middleton

A Resolution inviting representatives from WeSolar, the Department of Public Works, the Department of Housing and Community Development, the Department of Recreation and Parks, the Department of Planning's Office of Sustainability, the Department of General Services, the Comptroller, the City Administrator, the State Public Service Commission, and the Baltimore Gas and Electric Company to brief the City Council on commercial and residential solar farming and to assess how solar farming can benefit the citizens of Baltimore City.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Economic and Community Development Committee.

Bill No. 22-0107R - By Councilmember Stokes, Porter, Ramos, Bullock, Torrence, McCray, Conway, Middleton, Glover

A Resolution inviting representatives from the Baltimore City Public School System, the Baltimore Police Department, the Baltimore City School Police, the Baltimore Fire Department, including the Emergency Medical Service (EMS) Division, the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Safety and Engagement, the Office of the State's Attorney for Baltimore City, the Maryland Department of Juvenile Services, the Mayor's Office of African American Male Engagement, the Mayor's Office of Children and Family Success, and the Community Action Partnership to brief the City Council regarding safety in our schools, current safety measurers and future steps to take to keep our students and school staff safe.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Education, Workforce, and Youth Committee.

Bill No. 22-0108R - By Councilmembers Torrence, Ramos, Bullock

A Resolution inviting representatives from the Department of Recreation and Parks ("BCRP") and the Department of Public Works to provide information on the Druid Lake and Ashburton water tanks projects, including a general overview highlighting the importance of the projects, an updated time line for the completion of the projects, a summary of the environmental implications of the projects and any corrective actions taken on environmental issues reported to the Maryland Department of the Environment, an assessment of the scope of the projects and whether they are on track to stay within the allotted budget, a detailed description of the proposed park amenities and restoration, a discussion of BCRP's plan to maintain Druid Lake Park during the ongoing construction work, and an assessment of how these projects align with equitable neighborhood development for the surrounding communities.

The bill was read the first time and referred to the Health, Environment, and Technology Committee.

Bill No. 22-0109 - By Councilmember Cohen, Porter, Ramos, Bullock, Torrence, McCray, Dorsey, Conway, Burnett, Stokes, Costello, Glover, Middleton

Request for City Action - Fund to Support Reproductive Health Care

FOR the purpose of inviting the Mayor to work with the City Council to create a public fund that supports community-based organizations in Baltimore that are engaged in reproductive health services.

As the Supreme Court of the United States moves to strike down *Roe v. Wade*, 410 U.S. 113 (1973), the City of Baltimore must remain an exemplar for reproductive health care services. Our nation is in crisis. If the federal government will not step up to protect the reproductive health of our most vulnerable citizens, Baltimore will. To that end, Baltimore City Government has an obligation to actively and ardently support community organizations providing these essential services. The impending decision to dismantle *Roe vs. Wade* will strip away dignity and choice from people who most need government on their side. We will not allow needless suffering in our city.

Restricting access to safe abortions and reproductive health care poses risks to physical and mental well-being. Such restrictions force patients to delay care, shutter clinics providing life-saving services, and prohibit access altogether in neighboring states, such as West Virginia. This resolution is intended to protect all people with the capacity for pregnancy—cisgender women, transgender men, non-binary individuals, those who identify with a different gender, and others—who are unjustly harmed by restrictions on access to reproductive health care.

The people who will be most harmed by this policy decision are living in poverty in states that limit reproductive healthcare. These Americans face significant barriers to accessing basic healthcare and transportation. Many have faced various forms of violence and in some states, rape and incest will not be just cause to get an abortion. This decision by the Supreme Court is another way of punishing the most vulnerable. In particular, Black women are disproportionately impacted by a lack of quality reproductive health care. This group of women are also 3.5 times more likely to die from pregnancy or childbirth complications when compared to White women.

While comprehensive reproductive health care in Maryland is not presently threatened by the decision to overturn *Roe vs. Wade*, full protection of these services in our State must still be urgently prioritized. More than two-thirds of Maryland counties - home to a third of women living in Maryland - do not have clinics that provide abortions. Further, Maryland branches of Planned Parenthood have already reported an increase in patients traveling from Texas and anticipate an additional influx of patients from other conservative states that intend to restrict access to reproductive health care services. Access to comprehensive reproductive health care

and the budget of the Baltimore City Health Department must be expanded to compensate for the inevitable influx of patients seeking health services here in Baltimore.

The City of Baltimore has always been committed to the health, safety, and well-being of its residents. Therefore, the City Council asks that additional measures are put in place to ensure continued access to reproductive health care for all those who seek refuge in Baltimore. We invite and urge the Mayor to work with the City Council to create a fund to support local organizations that provide reproductive health care through the provision of microgrants to aid in increasing capacity. Such organizations include Bloom Collective, Mommy Up, House of Ruth, and Health Quality Innovators. Additionally, the City Council calls on Governor Larry Hogan to immediately release the \$3.5 million of restricted funds in the State's fiscal year 2023 operating budget to train healthcare providers and health navigators. Finally, we, the Administration should support the expansion of existing infrastructure and budgets of the Baltimore City Health Department and City Health Centers to specifically provide reproductive health care.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF BALTIMORE, That the City Council calls the Mayor to work with the City Council to create a public fund that supports community-based organizations in Baltimore that are engaged in reproductive health care services.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of this Resolution be sent to the Mayor, the Governor, the Honorable Chairs and members of the Baltimore City House and Senate Delegations to the Maryland General Assembly, the President of the Maryland Senate, the Speaker of the Maryland House of Delegates, the Commissioner of the Department of Health, and the Mayor's Legislative Liaison to the City Council.

AND ORDERED PRINTED FOR THIRD READING**

Councilmember Conway, for the Public Safety and Government Operations Committee, reported Bill No. 21-0094 favorably, with amendments.

An Ordinance providing for the establishment and implementation of a Public Safety Apprenticeship Program for Baltimore City; providing for the development and oversight of the Program by the Baltimore City Fire Department in partnership with certain other public safety agencies in Baltimore City; establishing the purposes of the Program; and requiring that the Baltimore City Fire Department report annually certain information to the Mayor and City Council and requiring the report to be made available on the Department's website.

On page 1, in line 7, after the second semicolon, insert "providing for a special effective date;"; and, on page 10, strike beginning with "the" in line 5 down through and including "enacted" in line 6 and substitute "July 1, 2022".

Amendment No. 2

On page 2, in line 4, after the semicolon insert "AND"; and, on that same page, strike lines 5 and 6 in their entirety; and, on that same page, in line 7, strike "(3)" and substitute "(2)".

Amendment No. 3

On page 3, strike lines 23 through 26 in their entirety and substitute:

"THE PROGRAM SHALL BE STAFFED WITH A REASONABLE NUMBER OF UNIFORMED AND NON-UNIFORMED PERSONNEL WHO ARE FULL-TIME MEMBERS OF A PUBLIC SAFETY AGENCY."

Amendment No. 4

On page 4, strike lines 2 through 4 in their entirety and substitute:

"(1) BY JANUARY 1, 2023, EACH PARTICIPATING PUBLIC SAFETY AGENCY SHALL DEVELOP AND IMPLEMENT THEIR OWN LOCAL PUBLIC SAFETY EXPLORERS POST."

and, on that same page, strike lines 21, 24, and 25 in their entireties; and, on that same page, in lines 22 and 26, strike “(v)” and “(vii)”, respectively, and substitute “(iv)” and “(v)”, respectively; and, on that same page, in line 23, after the semicolon insert “AND”.

Amendment No. 5

On page 5, in line 10, strike beginning with “60%” down through and including the semicolon in line 11 and substitute “A REASONABLE NUMBER OF EXPLORER POST ACTIVITIES AS DETERMINED BY THE HOST AGENCY WITHIN THE FISCAL YEAR IMMEDIATELY PRECEDING THE APPLICATION PERIOD;”; and, on that same page, strike lines 12 through 14 in their entireties; and, on that same page, in lines 15, 17, 19, 21, and 22, strike “(vi)”, “(vii)”, “(viii)”, “(ix)”, and “(x)”, respectively, and insert “(iii)”, “(iv)”, “(v)”, “(vi)”, and “(vii)”, respectively; and, on that same page, strike lines 25 through 28, inclusive, and substitute:

“EACH PARTICIPATING PUBLIC SAFETY AGENCY SHALL DEVELOP AND IMPLEMENT THEIR OWN SPECIALIZED CURRICULUM OF MODULES THAT EXPOSE PUBLIC SAFETY INTERNSHIP PARTICIPANTS TO THE VARIOUS UNIFORMED AND NON-UNIFORMED CAREER PATHS WITH THE PUBLIC SAFETY AGENCY.”

Amendment No. 6

On page 6, in line 10, after the semicolon insert “AND”; and, on that same page, strike lines 11 through 14, inclusive; and, on that same page in line 15, strike “(iii)”, and substitute “(ii)”; and, on that same page, strike lines 19 through 30, inclusive; and, on page 7, strike lines 1 through 13 in their entireties; and, on that same page, after line 13 insert:

“(3) BEGINNING IN FISCAL YEAR 2023, THE CADET POST SHALL USE A PHASED-IN APPROACH TO HIRE A MINIMUM NUMBER OF YOUNG ADULTS TO SERVE IN THE LAW ENFORCEMENT CAREER TRACK OR THE FIRE AND EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES CAREER TRACK IN THE FOLLOWING SEQUENCE:

(i) IN FISCAL YEAR 2023:

(A) 10 EMERGENCY MEDICAL TECHNICIAN (“EMT”)/FIREFIGHTER CADETS; AND

(B) 10 POLICE CADETS;

(ii) IN FISCAL YEAR 2024:

(A) 15 EMT/FIREFIGHTER CADETS; AND

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(B) 15 POLICE CADETS;

(III) IN FISCAL YEAR 2025:

(A) 20 EMT/FIREFIGHTER CADETS; AND

(B) 20 POLICE CADETS;

(IV) IN FISCAL YEAR 2026:

(A) 25 EMT/FIREFIGHTER CADETS; AND

(B) 25 POLICE CADETS; AND

(V) BEGINNING IN FISCAL YEAR 2027, IF FUNDING IS AVAILABLE, EACH AGENCY SHALL CONTINUE TO HIRE A MINIMUM OF 25 CADETS IN EACH CAREER TRACK.”;
