



While SB12 is an important step in the right direction, the bill should be amended to require local input regarding public art in instances when the State and local jurisdictions, like Baltimore, jointly fund a construction project. This would ensure that the public art aligns with community interests and culture.

When done correctly, public art has the opportunity to engage and define a community's history and culture. Thus, any expansion of public art funding and placement should be welcomed and supported.

**Now, therefore, be it resolved by the City Council of Baltimore,** That the Council calling upon the General Assembly to pass and the Governor to sign legislation that expands the current public arts mandate requirement to require public art in any building that receives at least 50% of its construction funds from the State; and requiring local input when local governments, like Baltimore, also assist in providing construction funds.

**And be it further resolved,** That a copy of this Resolution be sent to *the Governor, the Honorable Chairs and Members of the Baltimore City House and Senate Delegations to the Maryland General Assembly, the President of the Maryland Senate, the Maryland House Speaker,* the Executive Director of the Maryland Association of Counties (MACo), the Mayor, and the Mayor's Legislative Liaison to the City Council.
